Highway Jobs To Be Pushed

PORTLAND (AP) — The State Highway Commission considered still more projects here Friday, after committing millions of dollars to road-building Thursday.

Now off on the second year of its accelerated program to improve Oregon highways, the commission voted to issue another 15 million dollars in bonds.

That will bring to 30 millions the amount authorized. Another 10 million remains to be issued next year before the commission uses up the 40 million in bonds authorized by the last legislature.

The commission awarded more than two million dollars in contracts Thursday and allotted millions more for future projects.

Those for the future will include a \$1,100,000 project on the Pacific Highway in Douglas County.

The Anlauf-Elkhead road section there will get 7.8 miles of grading. There also will be a \$1,600,000 improvement project in the 12.7-mile stretch of the Coast Highway between Siletz Bay and Miner Creek.

Another \$300,000 will go to grading and landscaping the eastern end of the Banfield Expressway through East Portland. Farther up the Columbia River Highway \$532,000 will be spent, \$472,000 of it for paving and grading 7.6 miles of the Hood River-Mosier section.

DEATHS CUT
SALEM (AP) — Oregon cut its traffic death rate slightly last year, state officials said Thursday.

The toll was 429, the same as in 1950, but the rate dropped from 7 deaths per 100 million miles of travel to 6.7 deaths.

There were such entertainment celebrities as Jack Benny, Milton Berle, Bing Crosby and Dinah Shore.

Too Busy To Listen To Divorce Case

LOS ANGELES (AP) — John A. Brown, 69, didn't take time off from his \$175-a-month job as plant guard to contest his wife's alimony testimony.

Mrs. Isabele Brown, 72, told the court she is willing to cook for her husband and share grocery bills until they are divorced, but that she wants \$125 a month to get along, whereas Brown gave her only \$31.40.

The court awarded her \$80 a month temporary alimony.

The couple has been married 28 years; Brown has had his job 40 years.

Dimes March Hits Record

NEW YORK (AP) — The 1952 March of Dimes campaign ended Thursday night when more than a million mothers throughout the nation staged a one-hour Mothers' March on Polio which produced millions of dollars to fight the disease.

Scattered returns Friday showed \$4,650,670 collected in 123 of the participating 1,500 communities as compared to a final total of \$2,300,000 raised in 600 places in 1951.

Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, said the March had attracted more volunteers for the 1952 March of Dimes campaign, which was extended from the usual two weeks to a month this year, will not be available for some time.

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
