Western Pine Shipping Off

PORTLAND (AP) - Western Pine production, orders and shipments last week were higher than the previous week but all were under the same week a year ago.

The Western Pine Association reported that so far this year production was down 27 per cent from the same period a year ago. Shipments were off 34 per cent and orders off 31 per cent.

Comparative figures in board feet—000 omitted—for last week—the previous week and a year ago in that order:

Orders—73,214, 56,115, 76,892. Shipments—53,468, 47,857, 82,896. Production—45,917, 45,109, 61,116.

Cattle, Sheep Hogs Stay Steady

CHICAGO (AP) - Hogs, cattle and sheep were quoted nominally steady on the livestock market Saturday.

Hogs prices moved up slightly during the week despite some nervous, erratic markets, caused in part by the local labor situation in big meat packing plants.

Most offerings in the cattle section declined. The Agriculture Department said "outlet to local packers was not as good as last week by work stoppage in one major plant while Canadian buyers, who have been quite a support in the market for cattle grading and below, bought very sparingly."

The sheep section all slaughter lambs declined \$1.50 to \$2.50, uncovering the sharpest break of the winter feed season.

Volume came to an estimated 700,000 shares as compared with 660,000 a week ago.

CHICAGO (AP) - Soybeans and hard showed a little firmness on the board of trade Saturday in a market which, while steady, could not make a great deal of progress on the upside.

Most contracts of the major grains were ahead most of the session. However, one little selling squall developed in the second hour. It knocked prices under Friday's finish.

Paris (AP) - Russia charged the United States Saturday with using poison gas in Korea.

Soviet Delegate Jacob A. Malik told a joint session of the United Nations Political, Economic and Social Committee an attack with "toxic gases" was made by American planes Jan. 9.

He cited as authority for this charge a dispatch from the Central Telegraph Agency in Korea, dated Jan. 31. This story said American planes sprayed the village of Ulim in the district of Munchon with bullets that exploded, losing a toxic gas.

Malik said those who smelled the smoke were poisoned, and they suffered from respiratory ailments, nose bleeds and other symptoms of poison gas.

A spokesman for the American delegation denied the charge. He said it was an old accusation that had been denied previously.

Rangoon, Burma (AP) - A Russian official declared Saturday that wars in Korean and Indochina are only the beginnings of a fight for independence by Asian peoples.

KF Police Force Cut To Minimum

The flu bug and resignation Friday of another patrolman has reduced the Klamath Falls Police Department to a force of 19 men, seven under its normal complement.

Patrolman Tony Nelms resigned yesterday to accept employment in Alaska. Two officers have been confined to bed this week with the flu.

It will be another month before the force can be brought back to production. Civil service exams for both police and fire departments have been scheduled for Feb. 19.

Three of those applying for the police department, according to Police Chief Orville Hamilton this week indicated he may have to temporarily hire men on the force until exam results are returned and the applicants approved.

Youth Council Action Seen

The proposed Youth Council approach to Klamath Falls' juvenile delinquency problem received new and strong support yesterday.

The plan was endorsed by both the Inter-Agency Council and the County PTA Council. Both groups decided on special study committees instructed to explore and report on Youth Council progress as soon as possible.

The Inter-Agency Council, in luncheon session at Little Sweden, placed Mrs. Edward Geary at the head of its committee; the PTA committee head is to be announced by Council Pres. Mrs. Dale Baxter.

Mrs. Geary, not a member of the Inter-Agency Council, attended yesterday's meeting as a representative of the Klamath Union High School Parents and Patrons. That organization's Executive Board endorsed the Youth Council plan in a special session Thursday evening.

Action of the various organizations grew out of Herald and News Klamath Falls' "Good Citizenship" forums on the youth question.

Dr. James Millar, Portland, currently on tour for the Good Citizenship Foundation, addressed both the Inter-Agency Council and the PTA Council yesterday. Dr. Millar, speaking on "Good Citizenship in the Home," stressed the importance of proper youth training.

The Youth Council plan is designed to coordinate ideas and strength of interested organizations and individuals in the juvenile problem.

Soil Vote Ballots Out

Absentee ballots have been sent eligible landowners in the Eastern Klamath County area who can vote to extend the boundaries of the Langell Valley Soil Conservation District to include three-quarters of a million acres more land.

The district at present includes about 125,000 acres. Polling places for the election are the Bly Hotel, Bly, and the Horsely Irrigation District office, Bonanza. Polls will be open from 12 to 6 p.m. Monday.

The Langell Valley SCD was recently selected as a pilot district for improvement of public lands, and the proposed inclusion would also be brought under the plan.
