They May Be Slow, But They Got There At Last

WESTPORT, Conn. (AP) — World War II secrets were selling cheaply six years ago. C. Steve Vangor bought a war surplus safe full of em for only \$250.

Government agents came here Friday to retrieve the documents. The Army field safe was locked when Vangor bought it at a government auction in New Jersey in 1946. It remained locked until early last December when he gave it to a friend, Fred Dehmer, a local real estate dealer.

When a locksmith solved the combination in Dehmer's office, "secret" and "confidential" Army maps, records, manuals and photographs came tumbling out.

Vangor, an Air Force captain in the last war, sent a letter asking for instructions, addressing it to "The Commanding General, War Department."

After weeks had passed without an answer, Vangor and Dehmer called in a newspaperman and told the story. Less than 24 hours later, an FBI agent and a representative of the Army's counter-intelligence department appeared at Dehmer's office to gather up the documents.

One thing bothered the federal men. Vangor told them there was another locked safe in the lot he bought in 1946. He had given that one away, too, but he couldn't remember to whom.

Did it contain any secrets? NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Thirteen late airline passengers subdued their pilot who became drunk in flight and tied him in a seat to permit the co-pilot to make an emergency landing at Nagpur, a Civil Aeronautics spokesman reported Saturday.

The passengers, nine of them foreigners, handed the pilot over to police after the Nagpur landing. The spokesman said his pilot's license was suspended.

He said the flier, a hefty Australian, was ejected from the plane's control cabin after he permitted the plane to fall practically uncontrolled from 10,000 to 4,500 feet—on the promise of another drink.

Investigations are being made by Justice of the Peace M. D. Jones and the fire department.

Good Provider, And Still Jailed

TOKYO (AP) — Saburo Noguchi, 31, serving an 18-month prison term for swindling, asked his jailers for a month's leave to "attend to personal affairs."

His record was good. So he got the leave. He returned Jan. 16 on schedule and was locked up.

Friday police appeared at the prison and filed a new charge against Noguchi. While on leave, they said, he embezzled a 2 million yen, \$5,500 swindle to provide for his family until he gets out of jail.

Unemployment Pay Hits New High SALEM (AP) — Unemployment benefits paid in Oregon in January reached \$2,705,949, highest monthly total in two years, the State Unemployment Compensation Commission said Friday.

The figure was more than double the \$1,313,455 paid in December. The gain was 59.4 per cent over the January, 1951, total.

There were 40,320 jobless claims filed last week, compared with 27,311 a month ago. Nearly half the claims came from logging and lumber workers.

US Loses 52 Planes To Reds During January As Korean War Tempo Gains

By MILO FARNETI SEUL, Korea (AP) — Allied aircraft shot down 31 Red jets in January and lost 52 of their own planes, Far East Air Force reported Friday.

The Allied loss was the greatest in any month of the 20 month Korean war. Increasingly accurate Communist anti-aircraft fire destroyed 23 United Nations jets and 21 propeller planes. Five F-86 Sabres jets were shot down in air battles. One Sabre and two B-29 superforts were lost because of mechanical failures.

In addition to the 31 Russian-type MIG-15 jets shot down, Allied pilots were credited with probably destroying two and damaging 30. FEAF said during the entire war the Allies have lost 478 planes compared to 850 Red aircraft destroyed or damaged, including 611 MIGs.

The Reds have concentrated most of their anti-aircraft batteries—including Russian-built radar detectors—at such key points as Pyongyang, the North Korean capital, Sariwon, Sinanju, Sinuiju and other vital road and rail junctions.

These have accounted for most of the Allied losses. FEAF damage reports do not include the heavy pounding of Red lines by Allied Naval planes.

Far East Naval Headquarters said carrier-based planes cut rail-

way lines in 2,762 places in the past 23 days.

The Navy said the north-south line between Wonsan and Kowan was so badly battered the Reds have not been able to move a train over it for two weeks, "despite vast expenditures of manpower and materials."

Show and overcast skies grounded most Allied planes Friday morning. Fifth Air Force said only a few fighter-bombers went out on "operation strangle," designed to cut Communist life lines.

No major ground action was reported. One division on the Central front reported a temperature of 11 degrees below zero Thursday.
