U.S. Ponders Breaking With Soviet Satellites

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department said Tuesday American diplomats meeting in Paris early next month will discuss whether to close United States embassies in Soviet satellite countries. Press Officer Michael J. McDermott said the possibility of breaking diplomatic relations with Russian satellites "is being looked at by some people in the department from both sides" in preparation for the Paris meeting. McDermott said at a news conference top American diplomats from Russia, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Hungary and Romania are expected to attend the Paris meeting. Other informed officials told a reporter the conference would also seek to draft plans for giving better protection to embassy personnel and private American businessmen now in Eastern Europe. McDermott said the Paris meeting will be the third one held by American chiefs of diplomatic missions to Iron Curtain countries. McDermott said the entire question of diplomatic relations with the Communist world is always under review. But in response to a question, he said he did not know whether it had ever been placed on an agenda before. He was asked whether he considered the forthcoming discussion to be a matter of special urgency and he replied "no." Any decision to close American embassies would mark a decided shift in State Department policy. Until now it has favored keeping them open at virtually all costs to serve as "listening posts."
