Italian Exports Show Decline

ROME (AP) — Italy's exports of fruits and vegetables in 1951 dropped about 10 per cent below the totals of the previous year, according to preliminary reports. Up to Nov. 30, 109,260 carloads of fruits and vegetables were exported. In 1950 the total was 125,273 carloads.

The government is starting a survey to determine what price would be fair to the Indians.
