Churchill Meets Sad Young Queen

The Queen, unsmiling, waved back. **THANKS**.
Before leaving the airport, the Queen said she would like to see the crew of the airliner which flew her from Africa. They lined up on the concrete apron and in a low voice she thanked them all. Her face was pale and she was plainly under a strain. But her tears were unshed.
As the royal car swept through the gates, the Duke solemnly bent forward and arranged the rug around the Queen's feet.
Their car was followed by one carrying the Duke and Duchess of Gloucester.
In the streets outside, men bared their heads and women, some in tears, waved their handkerchiefs.
As Churchill's car left the field his chauffeur had to brake suddenly to avoid a collision with another automobile.

Airfield workers said the new Queen, while talking briefly with Churchill, stood in almost the spot where her father waved goodbye to her one week ago.
Meanwhile in London, 83-year old Queen Mary was advised by telephone of the royal party's return. **COMFORT**
She immediately drove to Clarence House to comfort her grieving granddaughter.
The royal car reached Clarence House at 5:05 p.m.
Crowds were lined along the street between Buckingham Palace and Clarence House as the Queen and her husband drove past. She waved as her car turned into the driveway of her home. The Duke stared straight ahead.
The limousine drive through the stable yard road entrance to the house. The big double doors of the building were flung open and the royal standard snapped from the roof.
The Queen was home.
At the Sandringham royal estate, where her father died peacefully in his sleep Wednesday morning, al-

lent, sorrowing carpenters sawed, hammered and fitted the King's coffin from a great oak tree, felled months ago on the estate where he was born and died.
The body of the monarch, dead at 56 after years of strain and illness, is expected to lie in state for three or four days in the gray, 16th Century Sandringham Church, where he worshipped every Sunday. He was in residence there at his favorite country retreat. **DEATH CAUSE**
Correspondents accredited to the court were told the King died of coronary thrombosis—a blood clot that reached his heart.
He had an operation three years ago to relieve a vein disease which could have led to the formation of blood clots, and last Sept. 23, doctors removed a cancerous lung.
The dutiful Elizabeth was Queen from the moment of her father's death.
She became so in her vacation lodge in Kenya Colony, far away in East Africa, where she had paused early in what was to have

been a five-month round-the-world tour.
But her formal proclamation as the new sovereign, Elizabeth II, must follow.
The proclamation, written from historic precedents by the Privy Council—hundreds of royal advisors, and representatives of Commonwealth countries, and the Lord Mayor and aldermen of the ancient square-mile City of London, will be read first Friday by the Garter King of Arms, Sir George Bellew.
Clad in medieval uniform, he will read from the balcony of St. James Palace, built by Henry VIII, father of the first Queen Elizabeth.
The proclamation was published in all morning newspapers Thursday.
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day and will be repeated simultaneously with Sir George's reading at Temple Bar, ancient Fleet Street gateway to the Old City of London, from the steps of the Royal Exchange in the financial district, and at Shire Halls and Guildhalls throughout the country.

A propaganda Christmas card dropped on U.N. troops by the "Chinese People's Volunteers" in Korea last Christmas was received in a letter recently by Mrs. Inez Griffin of Bly from her son, Sgt. D. G. Givan.
Sgt. Givan said he picked up the card "on Old Baldy—a hill that's ours during the daytime and the Chinks's at night."
The top page of the card bore the words "Merry Christmas." It was decorated with holly, bells, snowflakes and ribbon.
Inside the cover was the propaganda message from the "Volunteers."
It read:
"Whatever the color, race or creed,
All plain folks are brothers indeed.
Both you and we want life and peace,
If you go home, the war will cease,
DEMAND PEACE!
STOP THE WAR!"

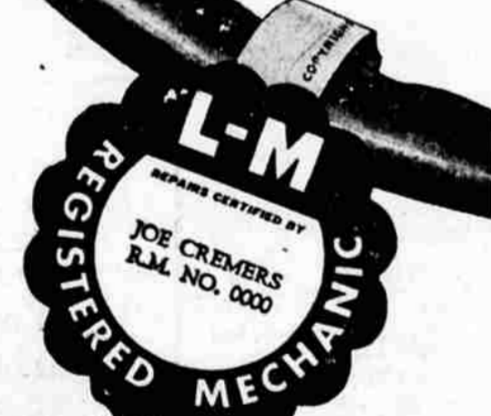
LUCKY?

ITALY NEEDS WHEAT
ROME (AP)—Italy will have to import 180,000 tons of wheat to meet the nation's requirements in 1952, according to year-end estimates. The major part, 110,000 tons, is expected to come from Italy's quota under the International Wheat Agreement. Other likely sources given in a recently published survey include: 20,000 tons from Russia, and 40,000 tons from Argentina.

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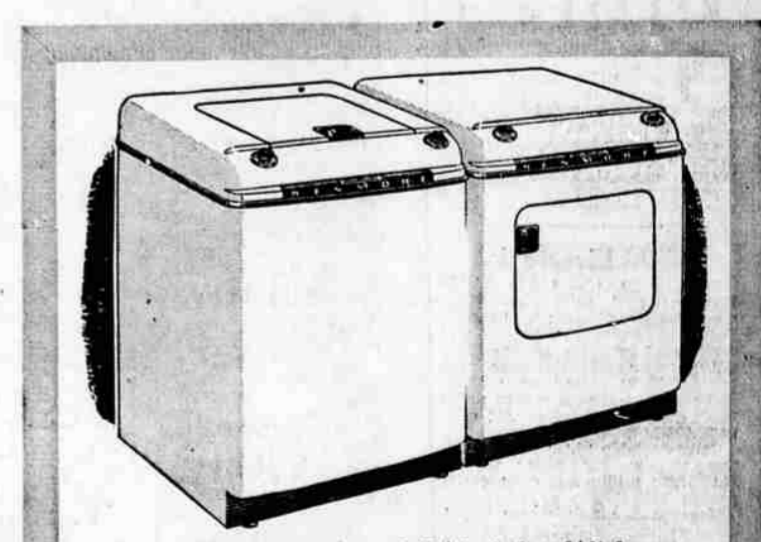


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
