Cage Run Tips Off Tonight

The Oregon Tech Owls hit the basketball homestretch tonight with a big deficit in the Oregon Collegiate Conference to make up.

But Coach Art Kirkland said his boys are ready for the two-game series with the Oregon College Wolves that will either write final to the Owls' title chances or start them on a comeback trail that leads to a title.

Here's the O.C.C. picture in a nutshell, with the Owls and the Wolves tip-off tonight on Oretch's court at approximately 8 o'clock. The Oretch junior varsity faces Yreka both nights in the 6:30 preliminary.

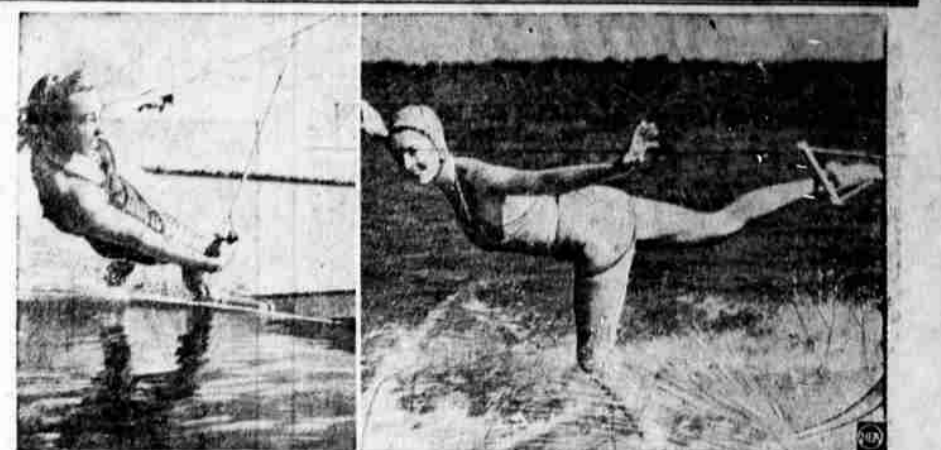
