## Right in the rounds

**CONFUSIN' BUT NOT AMUSIN'!**

We've just had a long session with a potato grower. He's one of the men who has been very active in growers affairs, and has been particularly just now on the OPS business.

Here's the pure quill.

A grower who has potatoes in his cellar knows that the calendar says that it's February and cold or high water, he's got to sell one of these days.

OPS has the thing clarified, it has men here, the market is started for spuds, so he might as well sell it now.

Well, a regular shipper one of the firms which normally handles most of the Basin crop, can buy spuds (we'll keep it on the basis of No. 1s, 2 inch minimum) for \$3.85 a hundred. The grower has to furnish the sacks, otherwise it's \$3.55. Of course, he's heard of some instances where somebody has made presents of the sacks to the grower. Well, skip that.

can hire him. If he's on the payroll, then he can go ahead and grade the spuds, sack them (we're not sure where the sacks come from this time not as himself, the grower, but as an employee of the wholesaler or whoever it was. Then he . . . then . . . (The arithmetic of our notes is a little confused on this deal, so we'll let it lay where it's at.)

At this point, another grower comes in with the word that the army wants 1200 cars right now. It can't get 'em because the army requires a three per cent grade tolerance. The grower knows it's three per cent—but three per cent of what?

At any rate, the three per cent of what-ever cuts him down that much, so he's not going to sell to the army.

The prediction, then, is that the army may step in and freeze all potatoes in the cellars. Freeze from sale; not by the thermometer.)

Of course again, you have to remember that one OPS office says you can do some of these things while another office says you can't. Most generally, the OPS man says he doesn't know.

(One OPS official, for instance, was reported to have told a San Francisco wholesaler, who was out of spuds: Go ahead and buy them however you can. We're not interested in what the grower gets. We're interested in the consumer.)

Behind it all the grower has in mind the possibility that one inquiry may be corrected, if the OPS follows through and brings out price regulations up to a par with the others.

As a result, the consumers down south are running out of potatoes, we're continuing to make healthy contributions to the bureaucrats (remember March 15), and—well, the planned economy of our great white father is confusin' but not amusin'.

Then another thing he's found out is that if he can find a chain grocer outfit, somewhere which needs spuds, it can pay him \$4.01. In this case he'll have to furnish the sacks, but will be allowed 16 cents for being a country shipper. That makes the \$4.01.

Of course, that by-passes the shipper who has been buying his crop for years, and it may break him. So, if he's going to do that he might as well go whole hog and find an independent store somewhere.

The independent can give him \$4.71. The gimmick here is that, unlike the situation of selling to the chain (or distributor; same basis), this time he can add 20 cents for sacks (to the \$3.85) then also add another 86 cents for being country shipper, carlot distributor, intermediate something-or-other, and then something else.

In the meantime, he's found another angle. A shipper, or distributor, or wholesaler, or somebody.

## Red Cross

WASHINGTON (AP)—What is the real secret of how to be a success in Washington?

Wilbur Peeble, the average American citizen, gives the answer in a letter to the editor about his one-man investigation of the government:

Dear Trellis Mae,

Well, honey, I found out how you get to be a big shot here.

Getting elected or appointed to an important job is just the first step. The rest is about your job. And to do that you got to have Ghosts and Indians.

As I get it, a Ghost is a fellow you get to write all the speeches and public papers you would write yourself if you only had the time. But naturally you are too busy shaking hands and making friends.

"As a matter of fact us ghosts are now getting assistant ghosts and the Indians are getting assistant Indians," he said. "We have things are getting that complicated."

## James Marlow

(Editor's Note: This is the ninth of 10 stories explaining how to make out your 1951 income tax return.)

WASHINGTON (AP)—Remember these points before making your 1951 income tax return on the 1940 long-form.

1. Besides Form 1040, you need that 16-page government pamphlet, called "How to Prepare Your U. S. Income Tax Return." It's the instruction sheet for using Form 1040. You have to use the tax rate schedule on the back for figuring your tax.

2. When a wife has no income, a couple can't lose by filing a joint return on Form 1040. For it to be a joint return, both must sign it.

In most cases, but not all, they'll save with a joint return when both have income. Since there are exceptions, try it jointly and separately before trying it in.

If you turn in separate returns and later realize you would have saved by a joint one, you can at any time before March 15, 1952, withdraw those separate returns by substituting a joint return to get a refund.

3. Be sure, before sending your return to the collector, that you attach to it all your withholding receipts—Form W-2, Form W-2, given by your boss, is the proof of the money he paid you and the income tax he withheld from your pay in 1951.

4. You file the return by sending it to the Internal Revenue collector for your district. With it you must pay in full any tax owed. If you were overpaid in 1951 on 1951 income, note that fact on line 8, page 1. Indicate there whether you want a refund.

5. If you're one of the self-employed people who must pay a Social Security tax now on your income from self-employment in 1951, show what your Social Security tax is on line 5, B, page 1. ## Parking Eyed In Lakeview

LAKEVIEW—A move to expand the two-hour parking zone in downtown Lakeview, with a three-minute parking zone near the post office, was taken by the Town Council this week.

Town Attorney Charles Foster was asked by the council to draw up a new parking zone ordinance incorporating the present parking zones and new ones designated Tuesday night by the council.

The council also discussed a proposal for the volunteer firemen for permission to buy property and build a new fire hall to house the fire trucks and disaster car. Mayor Carl Lange asked Councilman Ben Franklin to meet with the firemen and discuss details.

The parking problem came up in a discussion of parking meters. Council members stated that the present law to expand the parking law is being made in an effort to relieve parking congestion without the meters, but added that if this measure fails to do the job then they will have to consider installing parking meters.
