**Drunk Driving  
Fine Raised**

A year in office has convinced District Judge M. A. (Nick) Carter that heavier fines are needed on convictions of driving while intoxicated, driving during revoked period and driving during suspended period.

So Friday the fines on conviction of those three violations in District Court were raised, just like the cost of living.

Here are the changes:  
Driving while intoxicated—\$154.50 to \$250 increase.  
Driving during revoked period—\$25 to \$100 increase.  
Driving during suspended period—\$25 to \$100 increase.

Judge Carter said in neither of the latter two cases does the operator have a valid license. In addition, he remarked, the great majority of such persons do not have liability insurance and are not in position to compensate an injured party in case an accident results in serious bodily injury.

Judge Carter said he would not tolerate such a situation in this area.

**Mike Booms  
At Critic**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Price Director Michael V. DiSalle has fired back at one of his sharpest critics, Executive Secretary Whitney Tharin of the National Potato Council.

In a letter to Tharin, released Friday, the retiring Office of Price Stabilization chief accused him of having "rendered a disservice to your nation." He contended Tharin used pressure tactics in opposing OPS ceilings recently imposed on white potato prices.

Tharin, who says he has sent nine communications to DiSalle, has accused him of by-passing the law, Congress and the potato business, in setting maximum prices.

"We marvel at your seeking a seat in the United States Senate," Tharin told him.

DiSalle, who is resigning to run for the U.S. Senate in Ohio, replied that OPS officials talked with Congress members, potato growers and others before issuing the order. OPS had planned to issue an order Saturday granting a price increase to cover the cost of washing old crop potatoes, but the action was put off until Monday. An official said the allowance probably would be about 20 cents per 100 pounds.

**Bus Skids Into  
Deep Ravine**

HAMILTON, Ont. (AP) — An inter-urban bus skidded on icy pavement and careened into a 100-foot ravine here Saturday. No one was killed. Two persons suffered severe injury and at least eight others were less seriously hurt. The bus broke in two.

About a dozen persons were in the big Gray Coach Lines vehicle. The embankment at the scene of the crash was so steep rescuers formed a human chain to pass the injured up to the highway.

**Floods Seen  
This Spring**

PORTLAND (AP) — When spring thaws come to the mountains, high waters and possibly floods will roll through the Columbia River Basin.

That prospect was revealed Friday by R. A. Work, of the U.S. Soil Conservation Service snow survey.

He said mountain snows had an unusually high water content—up to 102 per cent above normal in the Methow River area of Washington State. In addition the ground below the snow in most Columbia Basin watershed areas is unfrozen and saturated.

It "raises a strong possibility of unusually high water in the main stem of the Columbia as well as numerous tributary streams this spring," he said.

Work declined to speculate on the extent of the potential flood. But reports from Idaho and Montana indicated damage in flood plains if the next two months' precipitation is only average. If the precipitation is greater than usual, a "very high potential runoff peak" is expected.

On the brighter side of the picture, Work said the survey revealed there would be simple irrigation and hydro-electric water supplies this year.

**HORNBILL PLAYS HOB  
WITH AIRWAYS OFFICE**

SEATTLE — Occasional severe weather, equipment shortages, and other problems may vex airline managers in the Pacific Northwest from time to time—but they don't have to cope with hornbills.

A small, female, concave hornbill, a bird with a bill like a pickaxe this week conducted a two-day reign of terror in Pan American World Airways office at Bangkok Thailand, according to reports filtering across the ocean from a nerve-shattered station manager to his more fortunate fellow-employees on this side of the Pacific.

His report says that when the lady hornbill arrived, it had all the outward appearance of a routine air shipment. The bird was housed in a wooden cage, with metal bars over one open side.

That night the bird managed to jiggle the cage next to some other packages, which were torn to bits and shreds.

"Apparently," the report continues, "she consumed a quantity of silver earrings. Hornbills eat anything."

Next night the bird was placed carefully in the middle of the cargo room, well away from anything else. In the morning, when the crew arrived to open up, they discovered the hornbill had moved its cage clear across the floor by lunging against the bars and had succeeded in chopping a large hole in the office wall playing its beak like a jackhammer, through the bars.

When one of Pan American's round-the-world clippers arrived to pick up the creature, the flight crew was warned to "keep an eye on this (creature)—she'll bore a hole through the side of the plane if you turn your back."

**Americans Can't  
Join Mourning**

SANDRINGHAM, Eng. (AP) — Five American women came to the gates of Sandringham Saturday to join villagers in paying their last respects to the late King George VI.

But the Americans, who identified themselves as wives of U.S. Air Force men stationed at Lakenheath, couldn't get past the gate. The lobby on duty said it was a strictly private affair for Sandringham people alone.

CHEHALIS, Wash. (AP) — J. Verne Shangle of Medford, Ore., said Thursday he has leased a large acreage south of Chehalis with the intention of drilling for oil. Shangle said operations would be started within a year, or leases terminated by that time.

**HATCHERY WANTED**  
WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Cordell H. Orr, has introduced a bill to give Oregon two acres of federal land needed for proposed fish hatchery at Ox Bow Springs, in Hood River County.

The state gave the land to the government in 1938 and wants it for a hatchery to be built with federal funds.

**OSC Working  
On Cancer**

CORVALLIS (AP) — Three Oregon State College scientists are manufacturing substances which may lead to new discoveries about cancer.

The three men — Dr. Bert E. Christensen, chemistry professor, Dr. C. H. Wang, research chemist, and Roland K. Robins, a graduate chemistry student — are working under a \$3,500 grant from the U.S. Public Health Service.

Christensen, who is head of the project, said he and his two assistants had found an easy way to make the substances by combining chemicals in nature the substances — purines and pyrimidines — are found in nucleic acid in living tissue.

He explained that any substance which could effectively retard the growth of cells was important in cancer research. He described cancer as a disease of uncontrolled cell growth.

After synthetic purines and pyrimidines are manufactured at Oregon State, they are shipped to Cornell University at Ithaca, N. Y. There they are tested on living tissue by Dr. Agnar Nygaard, a former OSC scientist.

**Judge Scolds Actress**

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Up in Vancouver, Wash., actress Anne Sterling's cars may be burning.

In absentia, as they say in the courts, she drew quite a dressing down Friday from Superior Judge Jesse Frampton.

Miss Sterling accused Yolanda Ruth Elliott, 40, a costume designer, of stealing a \$2,000 stone marten fur from her apartment Nov. 1.

Miss Elliott's trial was set for Friday. But Miss Sterling wrote that movie commitments made it impossible for her to be there.

"These Hollywood people," said the judge, "ask the protection of the courts, but they fail to appear when it doesn't suit their convenience — are found in nucleic acid in living tissue."

"Who do they think they are? Movie people are no better than anybody else. I would issue a bench warrant, except that Miss Sterling apparently is out of the state and it couldn't be enforced."
