The first benefit bridge tea . . . since then an annual affair . . . was given January 30, 1936 in the club rooms of the City Library . . . which were made possible through past fund raising efforts.

The proceeds of the bridge teas were sent for many years to Doern-becher hospital in Portland. More recently the money raised has been contributed to the Case Benefit Fund which is used to pay for tonsillecto-mies performed on children whose parents are unable to pay for them.
