Oregon Tech sliced its deficit in the fourth quarter of the Oregon Collegiate Conference basketball race last night by cutting down a desperate Oregon College last-ditch rally for a 66-61 victory.

With Len Genelin quarterbacking plays and Homer Duncan and Mary Hammack pumping in shots with monotonous regularity, the fans saw a rout for more than three quarters.

Then, with some seven minutes to go, the Monmouth Wolves turned hot and the Owls cold. The tide turned so quickly that the Owls turned a slender three-point lead with less than a minute to go.

The Owls opened the fourth quarter with a plucky 53-4 lead after posting a 39-18 intermission bulge. With seven minutes left, the Owls had no real cause for worry with a 59-43 advantage.

LEAVES Mary Hammack, who had the Wolves reeling with his drives toward the net, left the game at this point with four fouls. The Monmouth quint perked up with Hammack out. Roger Dasech opened the spurge with a field goal. Harold Pitcher added one and Chuck Pinion hit twice in quick succession to trim the score to 58-51.

Tom Schubert got a free throw but Pinion retaliated with another one from the floor to make it 59-53. The Owls started a stall at this point and Al Foreman broke through a field goal.

CLOSE COUNT Two minutes were left when McVay hit on a long shot to close it to 62-57. Homer Duncan, who scored 21 points for high-point honors and played watchdog on the boards, hit with his last field goal, a big one that brought it to 64-57. But Pinion wasn't through as he drove in for a shot but fouled in the process, his fifth infraction that gave him a seat on the bench. Howard Sullivan made it 61-64 with just seconds left.

In the Wolves pressing for possession, Foreman found a path down the middle to score on a lay-in for the last basket.

Forty-two fouls were called in all, enough to send five OCE lads and two Owls to the showers.

NIP AND TUCK The first quarter was nip and tuck, although the Owls put on a burst of speed that gave them a 19-12 lead going into the second frame.

Then Hammack and Duncan caught fire in the second to lead the Owls in a dazzling attack that carried them to a 36-18 intermission edge, as the Wolves could find just two field goals and two free throws in that chapter.

It was the same thing in the third and the first couple of minutes of the fourth until Oregon College opened its binge that fell short.

The two teams tangle again tonight. A win for Oregon Tech would give the Owls a second place tie with OCE in the OCC conference.

Webfoots Nip Idaho In Upset

By THE Associated Press SEATTLE (AP)— Idaho's rush to overtake the University of Washington Huskies in the Northern Division Pacific Coast Conference basketball race was stopped with a double barreled block Friday night.

By virtue of a decisive 69-56 win over Oregon State College while Idaho was losing, 56-49, to Oregon, the Huskies enjoy a full two game home stretch lead.

Oregon State did a better than average job of bottling up Washington's big Bob Houbregs, holding him to 15 long-shot points. But it gave Frank Gulness a chance to pour in 20 points from deep in the corners.

Washington's lanky ball hawkers were clearly superior through most of the game after taking away an early OSC lead but they never had a chance to relax. The Oregonians kept them well out on the floor and little Danny Johnston presented a problem of his own as he kept hitting the bucket for a total of 17 points.

Johnston scored three baskets in a row for the Beavers at the outset and they led until Washington caught up at 8-all, then went ahead 12-11. Halftime found the Huskies ahead, 35-21.

Idaho saw its hopes for a clean sweep of its four game series go glimmering early in the tilt at Eugene. They led until the Ducks tied the score midway in the first period, then pulled ahead at 14-11 to stay. A rally led by Guard Bob Hawkes in the second period gave the Ducks a healthy seven-point margin they clung to to lead, 30-23, at halftime.

They lengthened this to 34-23 as the third period opened, then hung on gamely to stage off an Idaho rally that narrowed the score to 49-46. From then on they built their lead back to seven points, nursing the edge with a tight defense and careful ball control until the final whistle.

ROUGH The game was rougher than the fray in Seattle, with 34 personals called and Ed Haller, sophomore Idaho forward, tumbled out on a disqualifying foul after tangling with big Bob Peterson in the first half.

Peterson was the Ducks' mainstay, netting 18 points. Hartley Kruger and Herb Melton led the Vandals with 8 points each. The teams meet again Saturday night at Eugene and Seattle.

A 28-point fourth-quarter rally fell short last night as Oregon Tech jayvees dropped a 55-57 decision to the Rex Club of Yreka Calif., in the preliminary game on the Hilltop court.

Jim McGregor, ex-Oretecher, led the visitors with 18 points. Jim Paterson, Wayne Holzfuss and Jack Brown paced the last-quarter rally that just fell short. The two teams meet again tonight.

In AAU championship swimming meets the relay scoring system has been changed. In freestyle relays the scoring will be on a 14-10-8-6-4-2 basis and in the medley relay on a 12-9-7-5-3-1 basis.
