



### Child Death Causes Found

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Asthma and bronchial pneumonia killed two small children whose deaths originally were blamed on antibiotics, autopsies have disclosed.

Dr. Edward M. Butt, chief pathologist at General Hospital, said Monday there was no evidence that any antibiotic administered to either of the children caused death. He said that Carole Ann Whitlock, 18 months, had been administered chloromycetin, but succumbed Sunday to bronchial pneumonia, and that Jackson Lee Beakley, 2, given aureomycin, died of asthma.

Physicians who attended the children refused to sign death certificates, pending an investigation. Dr. Roy Gilbert, county health officer, said he has no reason to believe that any antibiotic drug now being used will have any effect other than beneficial.

### Draft Dodger Faces Ouster

WASHINGTON (AP)—Draft Dodger Serge M. Rubinstein, wealthy Russian-born financier, Tuesday faced the government's third attempt in eight years to deport him. The Immigration Service ordered him deported Monday on grounds that Rubinstein's draft dodging in World War II constituted "moral turpitude." He was in the Lewisburg, Pa., Federal Penitentiary from May 5, 1947, to April 25, 1949, for evading Selective Service.

Rubinstein has 15 days in which to appeal, Immigration Commissioner Argyle B. Mackey, who signed the order, said.

LONDON (AP)—The three-year-old heir to the British throne is learning fast. Prince Charles was quickly re-presented Tuesday as a genkly pre-empted arms when the little boy was brought home from his daily romp in a nearby park.

### Hair Tugged, Brave Juggled

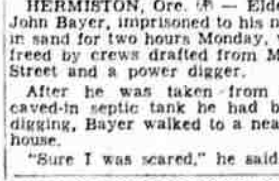
DENVER (AP)—Ute Indian Curtis Lehi says he doesn't remember pulling the chief's braids, but his wife says he did so he must have and he's sorry.

Federal agents brought the 47-year-old Indian here Monday from the Towaoc Reservation in southwestern Colorado. The charge is assault against Chief Jack House.

"It was a very bad thing to do—pull the chief's braids," Lehi said to reporters. "But I don't remember doing it."

Lehi, wearing blue jeans, plaid shirt and black hat, was arraigned before U. S. Commissioner Harold S. Oakes, who set bond at \$500.

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### Population Up In Canada

OTTAWA (AP)—Canada's population has grown 21.8 per cent in 10 years and now totals 14,009,429. Official census figures published Monday night showed the call of the Yukon still is strong.

The Yukon Territory's population jumped 85.1 per cent, from 4,914 to 9,066, between 1941 and last June 1, the date of the census.

Besides the natural growth of population, many persons from England and from displaced persons camps in Europe have come to Canada since the war.

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Among the provinces, British Columbia made the biggest percentage jump with an increase of by 809,887 to 4,597,542.

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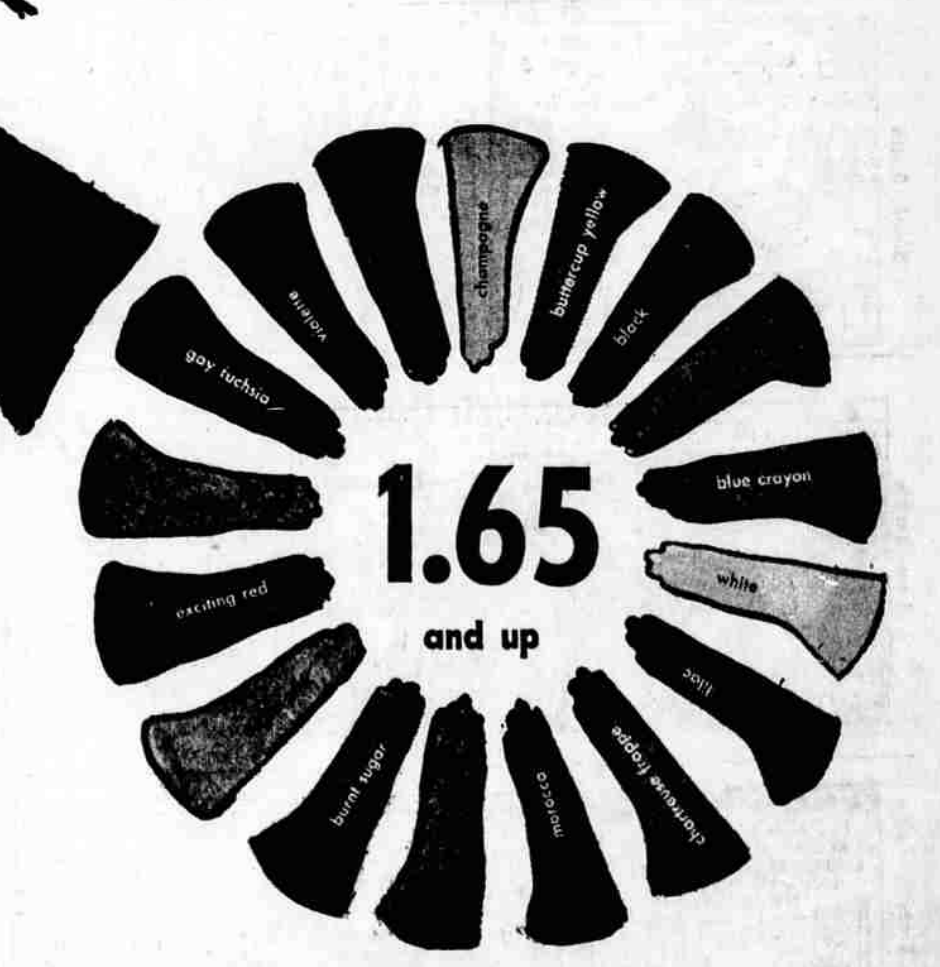


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
