

Co-op Goes Independent

LAKEVIEW—Alva Weekly, manager of Interstate Cooperatives, has announced that the Alluras branch is no longer connected with the local co-op and is operated separately by the newly formed Modoc County Cooperative Association. Manager is Leo Whiting, who formerly managed the Alluras branch of Interstate.

The local branch will continue to operate under the name of Interstate Cooperatives, with Weekly as manager. The local co-op was started in May, 1946, as the Lake County Cooperative, but in 1946 it was expanded when Alluras ranchers and farmers wanted in with the branch at Alluras. The name was then changed to Interstate.

The local co-op must soon appoint three new directors to replace Modoc County men who vacated these positions when they affiliated with the new organization. The positions were held by Master Ramsey, of Likely, who is president of the local co-op; D.E. Hill, of Cedarville, who was vice-president of Interstate and now vice-president of the new group; and Joe Weston, of Alluras.

Annual SCD Sessions Set

Klamath County's three soil conservation districts have scheduled their annual meetings for next week.

The Klamath SCD has slated its meet for the Midland Grange Hall at 8 p.m. Monday. Supt. Gene Gross and Dr. A. Halvorsen of the Klamath Experiment Station have been selected as speakers, according to Director Wilbur Harnesburger. They will include problems for the coming year in their discussions.

The Poe Valley SCD is to meet Tuesday at 8 p.m. in the Olive Community Hall, with top discussion slated for the proposed inclusion of most of northern Klamath County within its boundaries. Director Rex High reported Miss Pat Riley, Bonanza high school student, will speak on soil conservation, as well as Dr. Halvorsen who will discuss problems for the coming year.

Indian Meet Eyes Switch

Two representatives of the Klamath Indian tribe and E. J. Diehl, Superintendent of Klamath Agency, are in Salem today to confer with state officials on the matter of assumption by the state of certain jurisdiction over the Indians now exercised by the federal government.

Dice Crain, acting Tribal Delegate, and Dibbon Cook, secretary of the Tribal Council, went to Salem with Diehl and were scheduled to confer with Col. E. Morgan Pryse of the Portland Indian Service office, Gov. Douglas McKay and Harvey Wright, director of Indian education in public schools.

The idea of shifting from federal to state wardship has no precedent, Pryse said yesterday, but some Indians have asked for such a change and there is reason to believe many problems of the reservation could be handled better at a local rather than federal level.

In particular, state assumption of police and court authority on the reservation, as well as jurisdiction in juvenile matters has been suggested.

Last December the Tribal Council resolved to ask for a change.

The Klamath have been wards of the federal government for 87 years, since the treaty of 1864.

Pryse said the Indian Service has approved the principle of the proposed change as one phase of a long-range program of freeing the Indians from all special controls.
