



Miller, a Klamath County resident for 45 years, were conducted today from Ward's Chapel, with inter-ment in Klamath Memorial Ceme-tery. He died Tuesday. Miller was a native of Wabash, Inc., born in 1898, but for most of his adult life had been associat-ed with logging and lumbering in Northern California and this coun-ty.

PORTLAND 'M- Use of an in-tricate device that analyzes flood waves by electronics will be ex-plained at a meeting of the Colum-ona Basin Inter-Agency Committee here Wednesday. Discussion of the device, called an electronic flood routing ma-Discussion of the device, called an electronic flood routing ma-chine, will be particularly signifi-cant in view of forecasts of pos-sible flood conditions in the Colum-bia River basin this spring, com-mittee officials said. Other weather forecasting meth-ods aiso will be discussed by tech-nical experts from Portland, Seat-tle and Washington, D.C. Col. Eck-ley S. Ellison, head of the Port-land Weather Bureau, said he ex-pected Dr. F. W. Reichelderfer, weather bureau chief in Washing-ton, to attend. The committee, including gover-nors of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, also will consider a com-prehensive program for develop-ment of the basin. The flood routing machine saves time in computing flood stages for time in computing flood stages for downstream points when flood stages for downstream points when flood con-ditions occur, Anthony J. Polos of the Portland Weather Bureau, who will explain the device, said. It computes quicker and more accu-rately than manual methods. **Farm Credit** Loans Listed SPOKANE 47 — Thirty produc-tion credit associations in Wash-ington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana closed 13,195 farm loans totaling \$129,414.295 last year. The Production Credit Corpora-tion of Spokane said Friday it is an increase of 635 loans and \$29, 437,921 in volume over 1950. Montana associations led in the volume of new loans with \$42,059, 235; Idaho was second with \$38,115, 560; Oregon third with \$33,230,680, and Washington fourth, \$13,909,812. The corporation said the 30 as-sociations had 8,405 loans totaling \$49,677,991 outstanding as of Dec. 31, 1951.
