C. E. Miller Funeral Held

Funeral services for Clarence E. Miller, a Klamath County resident for 45 years, were conducted today from Ward's Chapel, with interment in Klamath Memorial Cemetery. He died Tuesday.

Miller was a native of Wabash, Ind., born in 1888, but for most of his adult life had been associated with logging and lumbering in Northern California and this county.

In his earlier days he worked in mills in Butte Valley and for a time worked as sawyer for Crane Mill at Bly. In 1936 he established the Miller Lumber Company at Lake of the Woods, operating it until 1940. He specialized in white pine.

After that he served as field superintendent for Klamath Forest Protective Association, and in 1940 he assumed the management of the Silver Lumber Company mill, operating at Pinehurst, and operated that mill until the present time.

Miller was a World War I veteran, serving in France with the engineers, and was affiliated with the Veterans of Foreign Wars and Izak Walton League.

He leaves many friends here in logging and lumbering circles. Survivors include the widow, Norma G. Miller, here; his mother, Mrs. Margaret Miller, and two brothers, Warren and Robert, Sunnyside, Wash.; a son, Glenn C. Miller, St. Louis; and a sister, Mrs. E. F. Meyer, Seattle.

Deeper Channel Move Taken

WASHINGTON (AP) — Action has been started by Rep. Anzell (R-Ore.) that may lead to deepening of the Lower Columbia River channel.

Anzell has introduced resolutions to authorize the Army Engineers to bring earlier surveys of the river up to date. He explained, however, that the House Public Works Committee will not vote on the resolutions until an opinion has been received from the Engineers on the need for a new survey.

Committee approval is required before a new survey can be authorized.

The Oregon congressman asked whether the channel should be dredged from its present 40-foot depth to 48 feet or some other level.

Army Totals Enemy Losses

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army Friday estimated total enemy casualties in Korea at 1,577,734 through Feb. 6.

That figure, covering Communist military losses alone, is an increase of 14,300 since the Jan. 25 estimate.

The total included 1,142,009 battle casualties, 303,358 non-battle losses and 132,277 counted prisoners of war.

In addition to the military prisoners, the Army also listed 37,859 civilian internees under United Nations military control.

The latest U.N. casualty report, issued Feb. 5, put losses of U.N. forces at 306,070 up to Dec. 31.

Petition Seeks Street Work

Property owners of Laverne street between the 4200 and 4600 Court for improvements to the street between the 4200 and 4600 blocks.

A petition bearing the names of 18 property owners and the wives of most was turned in to the County Court Friday.

The petition asked a survey to determine the cost of improving the ditches, grading and black-topping the street, so that the property owners can arrange to finance the work.

Death Proposed As Dope Rap

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A federal grand jury investigating racketeering has recommended the death penalty, if necessary, to halt the narcotic traffic in Southern California.

The jury classified narcotics traffic as a crime similar to murder and kidnapping.

Rare Sclerosis Clinic Planned

TACOMA (AP) — Construction on a \$250,000 multiple sclerosis clinic, first of its kind in the world, is scheduled to begin here early next week.

The clinic is being erected on the grounds of St. Joseph's Hospital with funds underwritten by Sisters of the Order of St. Francis, who operate the hospital.

Dr. Hinton D. Jones, Tacoma physician who has introduced a new technique in aiding sufferers of the disease will be in charge of the clinic.

Murray Again On Fair Board

Percy Murray, longtime member of the County Fair Board, has been reappointed to the board for a three-year term.

The appointment was made by the County Court. Other Fair Board members are Bryant Williams and J. A. Johnson.

The County Court also appointed Vern Moore, Harry Ward and Dick Hensel to the County Planning Commission, for four-year terms.

Other commission members are Jerry Sisemore, Scott Warren, Harry Obenchain, Hans N. Hanson, E. C. Lemler and Jesse N. Drew.

Re-Registration Time Set

About 6,000 persons in Klamath County whose names were lopped off the voter registration lists will have to re-register between now and April 15 to be eligible to vote in the May 16 primary.

Registration closes at 8 p.m. April 15.

The 6,000 were persons who did not vote in the last two general elections and for that reason their registrations were cancelled.

Kennan Gets Red Warning

WASHINGTON (AP) Career Diplomat George F. Kennan has received a pointed Communist warning that he had better be careful when he goes to Moscow as the new American ambassador.

Kennan, an authority on Soviet affairs, was nominated early last week by President Truman.

Officials reported Saturday the Warsaw radio, which takes its cue from Moscow, has now given notice that the envoy will be under close observation to prevent "spying."

A broadcast by an official Polish commentator reported that Kennan was chosen because of his long record as an enemy of Soviet Russia and because of the American desire to obtain all information possible from behind the Iron Curtain.

Old Newspaper Sale Reported

CINCINNATI (AP) — The Cincinnati Times-Star management announced Thursday it has purchased the 110-year old Cincinnati Enquirer, subject to court approval.

The paper was bought for approximately \$7,500,000 from the estate of John R. McLean, Washington.

The agreement to buy was signed by Hubert Taft, president and publisher of the Times-Star Publishing Company, and the American Security and Trust Company.

It must be approved by the U.S. District Court of the District of Columbia.

Hubert Taft said final court action might be delayed for "some months."

The Enquirer is this city's only morning newspaper.

Meat Control Foes Rapped

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Economic Stabilization Administrator describes as unwise a decision of the Western States Meat Packers Association to fight for lifting of controls this year.

Roger L. Putnam told the Packers' convention Friday that such a decision "puts the meat industry in a position of not seeming to care what happens to the consuming public in a time of national emergency. I'm sure the industry has no desire to find itself in such a position."

Declaring he is aware of the difficulties of applying price controls and quotas to the packing industry, he said that if there were no controls, there would be no way to check inflation.

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Steel Strike Blame Aired

NEW YORK (AP) — Philip Murray accused the steel industry Friday of attempting to provoke a nationwide strike as a lever to get government authority to raise prices.

The president of both the CIO and the CIO United Steelworkers Union told a Wage Stabilization Board panel that the industry had rejected every one of the union's 2 demands.

He said witnesses presenting the companies' case before the panel used hundreds of thousands of words which added up to "no."

The union has called a strike for Feb. 24. Murray and the union policy makers will meet in Pittsburgh Feb. 21 to decide whether to proceed with the strike or to await the WSB decision in the dispute.

Navy Builds Giant Station

WASHINGTON (AP) — The most powerful radio station in the world is being built by the Navy in the Jim Creek area near Snohomish, Wash.

The Navy took the wraps of secrecy off the station Friday night. It is scheduled to go into operation next year.

Three towers, each 300 feet high, have been built on hillsides above the station. They will support antennae 1,200 feet long across the valley.

The Navy said the million-watt transmitter will enable the high command to keep in touch with the fleet around the world.

Report Favors SEC Nominee

WASHINGTON (AP) — A House Committee investigating the Securities and Exchange Commission reported Friday it has "no credible evidence reflecting adversely upon the honesty and integrity" of SEC Chairman Harry A. McDonald.

McDonald has been nominated as administrator of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation but the Senate Banking Committee has refused to act on the appointment while the House inquiry is under way.

The House group, a subcommittee of the Interstate Committee, made its report on McDonald to Chairman Maybank, D-S.C., of the Senate Committee.

Rep. Heller, D-N.Y., head of the House group, wrote Maybank that his committee concurred "unanimously" in the report.

Food Checked By Electronics

PORTLAND (AP) — Use of an intricate device that analyzes flood waves by electronics will be explained at a meeting of the Columbia Basin Inter-Agency Committee here Wednesday.

Discussion of the device, called an electronic flood routing machine, will be particularly significant in view of forecasts of possible flood conditions in the Columbia River basin this spring, committee officials said.

Other weather forecasting methods also will be discussed by technical experts from Portland, Seattle and Washington, D.C. Col. Eckley S. Ellison, head of the Portland Weather Bureau, said he expected Dr. F. W. Reichelderfer, weather bureau chief in Washington, to attend.

The committee, including governors of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, also will consider a comprehensive program for development of the basin.

The flood routing machine saves time in computing flood stages for downstream points when flood conditions occur. Anthony J. Polos of the Portland Weather Bureau, who will explain the device, said, "It computes quicker and more accurately than manual methods."

Farm Credit Loans Listed

SPOKANE (AP) — Thirty production credit associations in Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana closed 13,195 farm loans totaling \$129,414,295 last year.

The Production Credit Corporation of Spokane said Friday it is an increase of 635 loans and \$29,437,921 in volume over 1950.

Montana associations led in the volume of new loans with \$42,059,235; Idaho was second with \$38,115,560; Oregon third with \$35,329,688; and Washington fourth, \$13,909,812.

The corporation said the 30 associations had \$405 loans totaling \$49,677,991 outstanding as of Dec. 31, 1951. It said 13 of the associations are now member-owned. Great Falls, Mont., and Walla Walla having recently repaid the government investment in their capital stock.
