'B' Spud Sales Advance Eyed

A proposal to put size B potatoes on the market immediately rather than waiting until April 1, as is planned, was turned down by Redmond and Tulelake members of the Oregon-California Potato Marketing Agreement Control Committee Friday.

The Klamath Potato Growers Association had asked that the B-ban be lifted by the committee so shipments could start immediately.

However, assistant committee member Bill Huse, Tulelake, said Saturday the Deschutes and Tulelake committee members felt the plan to put B's on the market later had been aired "pretty well" at a meeting in Redmond earlier.

Street Change Hearing Set

A hearing on a City Council proposal to widen Pacific Terrace is scheduled for tonight at City Hall, and the opposition has been forming for several weeks.

The proposal is to widen the present 16-foot traffic lanes to 20 feet, by cutting four feet off each side of the grassed-in center esplanade. The cost would be, by engineer's estimate, from \$47,000 to \$57,000, to be borne by the property owners.

Petitions have been circulated along Pacific Terrace against the street improvement, and a delegation of persons opposed is expected to appear before the Council tonight. If owners of two-thirds of the property in area object, the proposal will be killed.

It was originated by the City Council because of traffic hazards presented by the narrow driving lanes.

"Then the cost of a 30-piece orchestra went so high that no one could afford to package them."

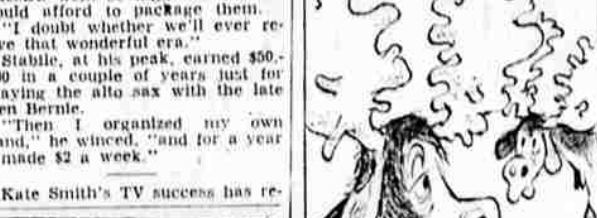
"I doubt whether we'll ever revive the wonderful era."
