SOROPTIMIST

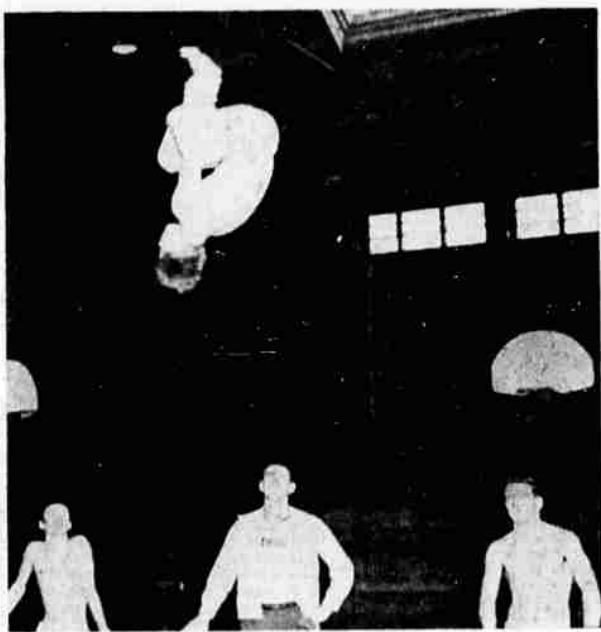
Soroptimist Club of Klamath Falls held a regular business meeting at the Pelican Praty Room on Thursday, Feb. 14.
