School Bond Issue OK'd

LAKEVIEW—In a special election Friday, voters of School District No. 7 (Lakeview) approved two measures for the improvement of the schools.

A \$270,000 bond issue for construction of a new 10-room intermediate grade building was approved 348 to 165. The School Board asked for the bonds because of present crowded conditions, plus the forecast that indicates coming increase in enrollments.

The second proposal, approved 454 to 61, was a matter in which the School Board asked authority to sign a 10-year lease with the Lake County Youth Foundation for using the Youth Center as a kindergarten. The Youth Foundation agreed to spend \$15,000 of funds from the J. T. McDonald-Truman Collins Trust Fund in adding two rooms at the center and to lease the building to the district without rental.

Firemen Plan Annual Ball

MERRILL—Members of Merrill Volunteer Fire Department are completing plans for their annual ball to be held Saturday in the Merrill community hall.

Fire chief Tom Chatburn Jr. will be in charge, assisted by the 30 members of the department, and according to all available information, this year's ball, the 45th annual, is believed to be the oldest in the state. This is the only fundraising event of the department, and all proceeds are used to purchase equipment for the department.

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Snow Blocks Crater Road

The Annie Springs to Rim Village road at Crater Lake National Park was reported temporarily closed today as snow depth at the park edged near a 20-year record.

According to Chief Ranger Lou Hallock, there is 191 inches of snow on the ground at park headquarters.

Since 4 p. m. of Feb. 13, he said, a measured 38 1/2 inches of snow has fallen in the area.

The ranger advised chains for passengers travelling the two open roads into the park region—the south and west roads. He said weekend travel amounted to only 21 automobiles carrying 81 persons. The weather, he said, was poor over the weekend.

Russ Claim Nut Record

LONDON—What the world needs, said Mahomet Andiev to himself, is a nut cracker that wastes no time getting to the kernel of the problem.

This is what he did, according to a Tass report broadcast by Moscow Radio Monday.

After brooding on the matter on the Voroshilov Collective Farm in Russia's Belokansky District, he invented a Stakhanovite nut cracker. It cracks 1,329 pounds of nuts an hour, replacing 120 men who had been opening nuts in a primitive manner.

It is all the more remarkable, said Tass, because Andiev is 161 years old. Now the ingenious old gentleman is constructing a machine to string tobacco leaves.

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Political Ads Lose Spirits

Klamath County voters may sit in their favorite licensed premises and "eats or discuss" political candidates.

Two OLCC men today told the Herald and News a section of the Oregon code prohibiting political advertising in licensed places (taverns and night clubs) would be strictly enforced.

The Commission representatives said a recent opinion by the Attorney General's office indicated the law would be strictly enforced during the coming campaign.
