CARROLL HOT; PELS WIN Malin, Bonanza Mix for Title Tonight

Antlers Nip Bobcats; Mustangs Post Upset

By RED HURD Malin, a team few expected to go so far, and the Comback Kids from Bonanza mix tonight on Pelican court for the Klamath County Class B basketball title.

Sacred Heart and Merrill meet in the 7-30 opener for the consolation prize.

The Malin Mustangs kicked up the second upset of the tournament last night, a 35-23 win over Chilquoquin, one of the tournament favorites.

Bonanza, hit with a double plague of ineptitude and injury before the tournament, had to fight off a last-ditch rally by the amazing Bly team to sneak into the finals with a squeaky 53-53 victory.

Sacred Heart, another favorite snatched down in opening rounds by the spunky Bly Bobcats, waited easily into the consolation finals with a 52-28 win over Henley yesterday afternoon on the Hornets' own floor.

In the other afternoon game, Merrill got by Gilchrist into the consolation showdown with a 47-38 victory.

Malin's upset win over Chilquoquin, even more a surprise than Bly's Thursday night's win over Sacred Heart and much more convincing, was a combination of a Chilquoquin team turned chilly and a baffling zone defense thrown up by the Mustangs.

Bly sets the somewhat dubious honor of figuring in the tournament's two top thrillers.

The Bobcats sent the fans away talking to themselves when they ripped Sacred Heart 50-49. Last night they staged a delirious rally that came close to catching Bonanza with its defense down in a rushing finish that had the fans reaching for the ceiling.

Chilquoquin found it a frustrating chore to dent Malin's tight zone. The Panthers missed badly when they did get in a position for a shot. Malin led all the way and had six points before Bob David found the net for Chilquoquin with six minutes gone in the game.

Inability to hit seemed to sock Chilquoquin with some punch. As a result, the Panthers played a pressing game that resulted in a flock of fouls.

Malin hit well from the foul line, 15 of 16 points coming by the charity route.

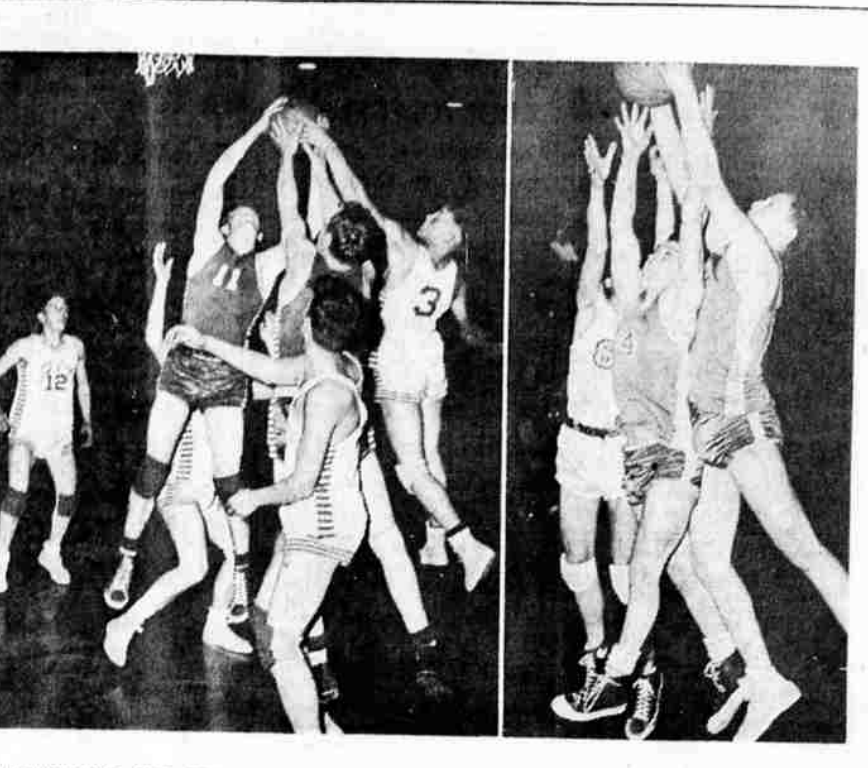
In the first half, Chilquoquin made five field goals to Malin's four. But the Mustangs fashioned an 11-11 halftime lead on 10 free throws, six by Wayne Rick.

Chilquoquin fans expected a second-half comeback by the heavily-favored Panthers—but it never came. Malin, playing cautious, control ball, held Chilquoquin to just a two-point margin and a free throw in the third frame, added seven points to close out the third quarter with a 23-14 lead.

Dale Fenters cinched it in the last frame by pacing the Mustangs with three field goals when he broke into the lane for shots when Chilquoquin was paying too much attention to Wayne Rick and Bob Stevenson, Malin's tall boys.

Bly took an early lead over Bonanza and held it until late in the first quarter when Vernon Haley knotted it 12-11 with a two-pointer and Maurice Chandler gave the Antlers the lead, 14-12, before the first-frame break, 14-12.

But John Jaquish got hot early in the second frame with three quick field goals from the key and

Owls Chilly as MacLean Sparks Vanport in 70-49 Cage Victory

By HALE SCARBROUGH Vanport's Vikings made it three out of three over the Oregon Tech Owls for this winter's basketball season last night, pounding out an easy 70-49 victory in the first of a two-game series on the big gym floor at OTI.

The two clubs meet again tonight at 8, the windup of the Oregon Collegiate Conference season locally. The Owls finish their schedule next Monday and Tuesday nights, playing Humboldt State here.

Vanport has an 8-1 record in the OCC, a virtual cunch on the conference title. The Owls are finishing in a good, solid third.

Don MacLean, who didn't start for the Viks, was their big gun

at all, and not because they didn't have a chance. They just weren't hitting. Tom Schubert, usually good for a fistful of points, missed seven shots from up close before making one stick.

By the middle of the second quarter it was evident that the only way the Owls were going to win was for the Vanports to suddenly and collectively drop dead, and that they didn't seem disposed to do.

Vanport was ahead 15-6 at the end of the first period, 39-12 at halftime.

In the third period the Owls managed their only real spurt of the game, scoring seven points in a minute and forcing Vanport to call getting 20 points. It is tied with the Owls now that period 20-11, but the Vanport margin was too great.

Mary Hammack and Wayne Hintz were ejected from the game in the first quarter for a scuffle that saw Hintz hit the floor.

54-42 Victory Gives Klamath District Tie

The Klamath Pelicans iron-manned their way to a district tie with Medford last night with Ralph Carroll, 6-7 center, taking care of the big scoring assignments in the 54-42 victory on the losers' own court.

Klamath Coach Paul McCall used just five players in the crucial win that secured up the district race tighter than the strings on a new banjo. The two teams close out the series tonight.

The big pivot man assumed the job with dispatch, dumping 32 points, 21 in the first half as the Pelicans left the floor at intermission time with a 37-27 lead.

The Pelicans took an early 4-0 lead and were never behind, although Medford spurred in the first quarter to come within one point of the Pels at 10-1.

The Pelicans stayed ahead by at least seven points the entire third quarter.

In the fourth, the Tornado managed to hack the margin to 40-46 and 42-48. But a Klamath stall frustrated Medford's attack as Carroll popped in a two-pointer, Ray Bell two for good measure.

McCall put Bell in the front line of firm Division, the victor over Gilmore, bringing the ball up floor for play-making.

The strategy paid off as Bell threw in five field goals from side-court when Carroll was tied up, concentrating on feeding the ball to Carroll in the key.

The Pelicans used their height to control the backboards most of the way.

The victory gave both Klamath Falls and Medford 7-2 records with two to go after tonight's game.

The Pels have two left with Ashland while Medford must meet the Grays Pass five in another pair.

Another Mark For Halbrook

By JIM COUR Associated Press Staff Writer Klamath Falls outclassed Medford, 54-42, in the feature game of last Friday night Oregon high school basketball schedule.

The result moved Klamath Falls, ranked No. 6 in the Associated Press state prep poll, into a tie for first place with Medford, rated No. 7, in the big four division of Southern Oregon's Class A District 4.

Ralph Carroll, six-foot seven-inch center, paced the winners with 32 points. The teams meet again at Medford Saturday night. The victor will gain the inside track for the division title and a place in the district play-off, with Crater of central point, for a berth in the state tournament at Eugene next month.

Wade "Suede" Halbrook's 71-point performance, setting a new Northwest high school scoring record, tended to overshadow the fact that Lincoln and Cleveland clinched places in the tourney as Portland League representatives.

FANTASTIC Halbrook posted his fantastic total as Lincoln walloped Roosevelt, 90-53, for the Cardinals' 10th victory in 11 league games and their 17th in 19 starts this season.

Cleveland defeated Washington, 52-32, bringing its season record to 16 in 18 games. It is tied with Lincoln for first in the Portland circuit and ranked No. 2 in the AP poll. Lincoln is rated No. 3.

Should Cleveland and Lincoln finish in tie, they will be Portland co-champions but will play off to determine their pairings in the tournament.

The winner probably would have to meet Central Catholic of Portland, ranked for the past four weeks as the state's top team and favored to win the District 13 title, in the first round.

Central Catholic bagged its 18th victory in 19 games Friday night, defeating a tough Oregon City team, 49-42. As usual, All-Star Bob Altenhofen sparked the Rams, Marshfield, ranked No. 4 in the state and favored to capture the Southwest Oregon District 5 playoff, routed North Bend, 67-45.

NO DANGER Title holding Washington, its crown jewels no longer in danger, went to the conference to squeeze through with a 52-50 win over Wyming at Laramie.

The Ducks waddled along behind the Pullman much of the time until late in the second quarter when Kent Hunt, their leading scorer, dunked one to put them ahead in the final quarter. Then they made it a wide open game, tying the score four times in the closing minutes before Washington's Bob Hourberg coastly hit a lay up 30-30 in the final nine seconds. They meet again Saturday night.

O'Brien 34 Points Away

PORTLAND (AP) — His team lost Friday night, but Seattle University's John O'Brien was within 34 points Saturday of the nation's all-time single season basketball scoring record.

Johnny O fouled out in the last two minutes after flipping in 34 points, and was forced to watch as Portland University pulled the game out of the fire with less than 10 seconds to go, 83-82.

O'Brien ran his season's total to 933 before he was sidelined and will be shooting Saturday night in a rematch with Portland to break the record of 967 set by George King of Morris-Harvey in 1949-50.

The University of Arizona basketball team played before an estimated 47,500 spectators during its recent five-game eastern and midwestern tour.

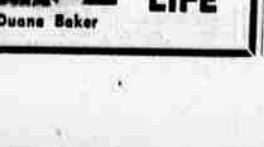
