Three-Point Issue Seen

BUFAFLO, N. Y. (P) — A three-point challenge faces all Christians in everyday business and social life, according to a formal report issued by 325 delegates to the North American Lay Conference on the Christian and his Daily Work.

As outlined in the statement at Sunday's closing session, God requires: "1. That we work in partnership with Him and in accordance with His laws."

"2. That we work unselfishly for the good of our fellow man."

"3. That as members of the church, we search our minds and hearts as we seek to live up to the highest standards which Christ taught us."

Laymen from 34 Protestant church groups in the United States and Canada adopted the brief, 500-word statement after an hour's debate.

Load Limit Set On New Highway

PRINEVILLE (P) — A highway load limit on Marks Creek cutoff, a 10-mile stretch of new highway in the Ochoco National Forest, has been ordered to protect the road and logging interests are attempting to get it modified.

The road is used extensively for log and lumber hauling between Mitchell and Prineville. Some lumbermen said the limitation, if unchanged, would put 500 men out of work in this area.

They hope to get a postponement while they clear snow from the old part of the road, now abandoned. They think that would take 10 days and since cold weather has replaced a recent thaw, they say the new route would not be damaged in that time.

Tattle Fees On Increase

WASHINGTON (P) — If you're fudging on your income tax return this year, better watch out for nosy neighbors.

The business of tattling to the government in income tax evaders' names is booming as never before.

The Revenue Bureau reported Monday it paid out half a million dollars last year to informers who tipped the government to tax violations by business associates or neighbors.

As a result of the tips, revenue agent picked up \$9,737,846 more in taxes for the fiscal year which ended June 30.

All signs indicate this will be an even bigger year for informers, citizens pouring in tips on recurring revenue scandals are likely to uncover even more evasion.

In the past three years, payments to informers have averaged \$480,000 a year, a tremendous increase over former years.

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
