## Pole Price Ceilings On

CORVALLIS (AP)—Price control on poles and piling dominate news of the farm forest product activity. Oregon State College extension service reported Tuesday. Camp-run sawlogs must not exceed the ceiling for No. 3 sawlogs, the service reported as an OPS interpretation. No interpretation is yet available on second-growth prices for Lane County which were omitted from the OPS order. On the camp-run ruling, it is assumed that all logs will be of the lowest grade. To get better than No. 3 prices, sales will have to be on a grade basis.

## Anti-Betting Petition Started

SALEM (AP)—A preliminary initiative petition to ban all betting on horse and dog races in Oregon was filed here Tuesday by the Oregon Council of Churches. If the sponsors get 26,286 signatures, the measure would be on the November election ballot. It would amend the state constitutional, which now prohibits lotteries.

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## Oregon Roads Free Of Snow

SALEM (AP)—Motorists could drive any place in Oregon Tuesday without chains, the State Highway Commission reported.

The commission said there were spots of ice in Willamette Pass and at Meacham, Bly, Baker and Seneca. Pavement was bare at all other points. The commission, in its weekly construction report, listed the following traffic delays because of construction: Columbia River Highway from Cascade Locks to Hood River, Pacific Highway at Canyonville and from Lane county line to Anlauf, Coast highway from Reedsport to Winchester Bay, and Bunker Hill to Delmar. Unity-Baker highway from Bunker Hill to Baker, Umatilla Highway on the Reedsport-Scottsburg section, Willamette Highway around Meridian Dam; Shanks-Fossil highway, and on the Warner Valley highway from Drake's Creek to Adel.

## UMT Debate Hottest Yet

WASHINGTON (AP)—Universal Military Training was assailed in House debate Tuesday as "undemocratic and unnecessary" and was urged as a step the United States must take for its own safety. Opening debate on the hottest issue now before Congress, Rep. Vinson (D-Ga.) said UMT is needed because the United States faces "a possibility of sudden war tomorrow and a threat of war over an extended period of time." Vinson is chairman of the House Armed Services Committee which put together the UMT bill. In reply, Rep. Arents (R-Ill.) called UMT "undemocratic, costly, impractical, inequitable and unnecessary."

"This is a permanent peacetime conscription bill brought here under the guise of an emergency need and an erroneous conception as to our defense requirements," Arents said. The House schedule throughout this week calls for debate on whether 18-year-old youths shall be required to take six months of military training and then revert to a reserve status for the next 7 1/2 years.

**SOUTH KOREAN AMNESTY**—BUSAN, Korea (AP)—The South Korean government announced Tuesday 3,613 prisoners would be released from jails March 1 and sentences of 2,218 others reduced. The general amnesty, an annual affair, commemorates the Korean independence movement against the Japanese.
