Paisley Out Of Play-offs

Now that Bonanza has the Klamath County crown jewels safely tucked away in its cage chest, the Antlers have bigger things in mind.

To be exact, Merton Whipple's Bonanzas are looking toward March 5 when they'll open a District play-off series with the Rogue River Chieftains on the Henley floor.

Rogue River, Jackson County champ, wrapped up its title last Friday with an 86-42 win over Prospect.

Paisley, Lake County Dist. 5 representative, dropped out of contention when it was discovered it opened its playing season before Dec. 1, against Oregon Schools Activities Association rules.

Paisley, under ordinary circumstances, is entitled to a crack at the Klamath County winner before the final district showdown with the Jackson County champion.

But Paisley wisely withdrew. The winner of the Bonanza-Rogue River play-off will earn a state tournament berth.

The first two games will show in the Henley gym March 5 and 6. A third, if necessary, goes to a neutral court over the hill, probably the Grants Pass gymnasium March 8.

It was considered a break for Bonanza when Paisley dropped out. The extra time will give Don Hubble's ankle time to heal.

The Bonanza forward performed in good style for the Antlers in the tournament but the strain on his ankle started to show in the late stages of the tournament.

Hubble sprained his ankle 10 days before the tournament in a non-league game with Bly.

Bonanza's victory was considered a comeback feat inasmuch as three of the Antlers were declared ineligible, one a regular, just before tournament time.

This, together with Hubble's injury, bumped Bonanza out of a favorites' role in the three-day tournament.

Malin Keeps Rifle Lead

Langell Valley trimmed both Moose and American Legion in recent matches to slip into second place in the Midland Empire rifle league behind Malin, winner over Butte Valley.

Klamath Falls is tied for third with Butte Valley after outshooting Chiloquin.

When the sixth- and largest winter carnival under Olympic auspices closed Monday night, Norway had scored 125 1/2 points in the unofficial, but traditional, scoring table that allows 10 points for a first place gold medal, five points for second and then 4-3-2-1 for other placings in the first six.

The United States, with its best balanced team in the history of the winter games, was a surprisingly strong second, but its total of 89 1/2 was a long way behind Norway.

Four years ago, at St. Moritz, less than 14 points separated top of the table Sweden and the fourth place Americans.

The United States this year improved in every department except bob-sledding. American skiers scored 9 1/2 more points than last time and produced their first winter Olympic double winner—Mrs. Andrea Mead Lawrence, 19-year old daredevil from Rutland, Vt.

Even the American hockey team did better than expected. An all out effort against unbeaten Canada in the final game produced a 3-3 tie which gave the U.S. the one additional point it needed to finish second.

Oretech Ends Run Tonight

The Oregon Tech Owls scored virtually every time they wheeled up their spacious court last night in a 96-50 win over the Humboldt State Lumberjacks.

The Owls close out their season tonight against the Arcata, Calif., visitors. The Junior varsities of both clubs mix in the 6:45 preliminary.

It was the second time this year the Owls had the crowd yelling for a hundred points. If the first team had gone all the way, it would have been much more than 100. But the regulars played just a little more than half the game.

LONG SHOT Len Gerstein started the scoring parade with a long shot. Bob Dunaway tied up or the Jacks but that's the only time the Arcata five was in the ball game.

It was 24-12 at the quarter mark. 49-26 at the half with OTI reserves mopping up in the second quarter. The first team ran it to 71-33 in the third, then reserves finished the chore.

Warne Holzhaus, moving nicely in the key and controlling the boards with authority, rolled in 21 points for high point honors as nine players took big whacks at the score column.

Tom Schubert, sparking first third quarter splurges, finished with 17. Jerry Wyatt had 14. Genitino 12 and Dick Flamingan 10.

In one spurt in the second quarter, the Owls ran the score from 26-15 to 43-15 in just slightly more time than it takes to write about it. Holzhaus led this blitz.

Oretech made it a grand slam for the evening. The junior varsity trounced the Humboldt jayvees, 50-40, in the preliminary. Flamingan and John Koch each had 9 as practically every player scored. But Humboldt's Jerry Smith was high with 15.

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP)—The Idaho Vandals, once regarded as a red hot candidate to win the Northern Division title, wind up their Pacific Coast Conference basketball season Tuesday night trying to stay out of third place.

The Vandals bow out against the Oregon Ducks who laced them 66-60 Monday night to move up to second behind the champion Washington Huskies.

The victory gave Oregon the runner-up spot by six percentage points. The Ducks have two games left with Oregon State.

Capt. Ken Hunt and big Chet Noe chucked up 33 points between them—half the Oregon total—as the Ducks won the series opener.

Hunt got 19 and generally guided the Oregon offense.

Oregon led 27-32 at halftime and was never headed but twice blew comfortable leads.

The Ducks had a 43-34 edge early in the third period before Hartley Kruger, Dwight Morrison and Herb Millard cut it down to 47-45. It was 61-52 for Oregon in the fourth and Kruger led a rally that narrowed the score to 61-59. Bob Peterson, Noe and Mel Streiter then extended the margin.

Oregon was able to stall out the final four minutes.

Kruger, a tall junior with a fine hook shot, led the Vandals with 18 points. Idaho hit on 31 per cent of its shots, Oregon on 34 per cent.

NEW YORK (AP)—The National Champion Kentucky Wildcats kept a firm hold on first place in the Big Ten title by upending Iowa 75-62 Saturday, leaping from fifth to the runner-up spot in the latest ratings by the nation's sports writers and broadcasters.

Kansas State and Duquesne, who had been breathing down the Wildcats' necks, lost little prestige, however, from their upset defeats over the week-end.

The Kansas Staters, surprised by Colorado 67-57, fell only a notch, from second to third and at the same time shoved Duquesne, its 18-game winning streak broken by Villanova, from third to fourth.

Kentucky picked up 51 of the 133 first-place votes cast and scored a total of 953 points on the basis of a ten for a first place vote, nine for second and on down the line.

Actually there was a remarkably mild shakeup in the top ten considering the wave of upsets that swept through college basketball ranks the last few days.

St. Louis moved from ninth to fifth place and Iowa dropped from fourth to seventh.

Otherwise, the changes weren't anything to get excited about.

Washington, for example, held the sixth position despite a 55-45 loss to Wyoming. The Cowboys were rewarded by graduating from 10th to 16th.

Seattle University, No. 16 last week, dropped out of the second ten after its double loss to Portland. Seattle ranked No. 22 in the new poll.

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Klamath, Medford Switch

By The Associated Press Central Catholic of Portland has been voted Oregon's best high school basketball team for the fifth straight week.

The Rams, who have won 19 of their 20 games, now have been rated No. 1 six times this year by sportswriters and sportscasters who choose the top ten teams in the weekly Associated Press poll.

Lincoln of Portland moved up from third to second after defeating Cleveland, which dropped from second to third. Lincoln got two first-place votes from writers, who perhaps were impressed by Wade Halbrook's 71-point night against Roosevelt last Friday.

Central Catholic polled 10 votes for first it probably will be in the same bracket as Lincoln or Cleveland, whichever is top in the Portland league, in the first round of the state tournament at Eugene next month.

Marshfield and McMinnville, placing No. 4 and No. 5, again were rated as the best upstate teams. They have completed their regular schedules and will be idle until play-offs in their districts.

Marshfield is expected to represent Southwest Oregon district 5 in the state tournament and McMinnville is favored to be the district 8 entry.

Medford jumped a notch to No. 8 after edging Klamath Falls Saturday night and becoming favorite to win the Southern Oregon district 4 title. Klamath Falls dropped from No. 6 to No. 7 despite an impressive victory over Medford Friday night.

La Grande, a favorite to take the district 1 title and a state tournament berth, was eighth.

Oregon City elbowed into the top ten by trimming Tigard and losing to Central Catholic only after giving the Rams the toughest battle they have had in weeks. Oregon City, Milwaukie and West Linn are the favorites in the district 12 play-offs, which begins Tuesday night.
