MOSCOW IP—The Soviets have accused the American and Canadian Olympic hockey teams of a "behind scenes deal" by which the Canadian team "threw" its last game with the Americans, thereby permitting the United States to Wis second place in the winter games, (Canada and the U.S. played a 3-3 tie in their last game in the Olympic competition at Oslo. The Soviets charged the alleged "deal" was aimed at keeping Czechoslovakia out of second place in the hockey conpetition.

There was no immediate comment from Canadian and U.S. sources.
