**SALEM (AP)** — Forms to enable Harold A. Stassen to file in Oregon's Presidential primary were sent to Stassen Tuesday by the State Elections Division.

David O'Hara, chief clerk of the elections division, said Stassen asked for the forms in a telegram Monday.

Stassen is the first candidate of either party to indicate he would file his own name.

The names of the other candidates who have filed so far and Gen. Eisenhower and MacArthur were filed by petition.

Stassen ran in the primary four years ago closing out to Thomas E. Dewey, who won the Republican nomination for president.

Petitions are not necessary if a candidate files his own name. The deadline for filing is March 7, and the primary will be held May 16.

**US Ahead In Plane Making**

**NEW YORK (AP)** — How does the United States Air Force stack up against Russia's?

Air Secretary Thomas K. Finletter, in a speech before the New York Patent Law Association Tuesday night, had these comments on the subject:

"Production — Russia is ahead, but the U.S. is catching up.

Fighter-bombers — America is definitely ahead.

Medium and long range bombers — the U.S. is 'well ahead in the quality.'

Light bombers — The two air forces are about equal.

The newest Russian bomber, known as 'type 31' — not as good as our B-36 heavy bomber.

**US Planes Blast Red Jet As Sky Battles Resume --- Ground Action Held Down**

**SEOUL, Korea (AP)** — U.S. Sabre jet pilots shot down one Communist MIG-15 and damaged another Wednesday in a 10-minute fight in clearing North Korean skies.

It was the first jet battle since Saturday.

The Sabre pilots said they traded firing positions with about 100 MIG-15 in the morning, 80 early in the afternoon and 60 toward evening.

It was in the last brush that the Sabres scored. Maj. Van Chandler of Waxahachie, Tex., was credited with destroying one Red jet, his third of the war. Capt. George Dunn of Wilmington, Del., damaged one.

As the snow and clouds of the past few days cleared, the U.S. Fifth Air Force flew about 500 sorties in the 24-hour period ended at 6 p.m. Wednesday—a nearly normal number.

In the preceding 24-hour period the Fifth Air Force flew only 28 sorties, lowest in three months.

In the last jet battle on Saturday about 200 Red jets showed up south of the Yalu River. The Sabres knocked down one and damaged two.

Fifteen bombers on Operation Strangle Wednesday cut Red rail lines in 90 places and destroyed or damaged one rail bridge, 72 rail cars, two airfield planes, one anti-aircraft position, 34 supply buildings and three fuel dumps.

Ground action continued light Wednesday. The U.S. Eighth Army's night communique reported only light patrol clashes all along the 155-mile battlement.

The communique said the biggest battle was a 70-minute clash between an Allied patrol and 25 Chinese west of Chorwon on the Western Front.

United Nations forces on the Central Front reported light patrol skirmishes with Red units, a platoon in strength, mostly along the Kumbwa-Kumsong road.

**US Destroyers Touring World**

**YOKOHAMA, Wednesday, Feb. 27 (AP)** — Four U.S. destroyers, veterans of the Korean war, slipped away from their berths in the cool grey dawn Wednesday morning and started a trip around the world "to show the flag."

The good will cruise was reminiscent of the famed White Fleet cruise of 1908 when 16 warships under Rear Adm. R. D. Evans toured the world and dropped anchor at Yokohama to impress Japan.

President Theodore Roosevelt sent the fleet to show the flag and to show friendship.

A Naval spokesman said the current cruise likewise "is to show the flag."

Selected for the cruise are the Hyman, Beatty, Purdy and Bristol, all swift, modern warships which make up Destroyer Division 122.

The first port of call is Hong Kong. The other ports are unannounced, but it is believed they will include Ceylon, Bahrain, Aden, Port Said, Naples, Cannes, Gibraltar and the Azores.

Capt. W. H. Groverman, Covington, Ky., commander of Destroyer Division 122, hopes to have the men and ships home in Newport, R. I., about April 30.

**Hay, Straw Go On Banned List**

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Agriculture Department officials said Tuesday an order banning livestock shipments from Canada, because of an outbreak of foot and mouth disease, also applies to hay and straw.

An official told a reporter these products are involved:

Prohibited: Cows, sheep, goats, and hogs and any fresh, chilled or frozen beef, veal, mutton, lamb and pork.

Restricted: Hay and straw and animal by-products, such as hides, skins and bone meal. In effect, the official said, there is little difference between a flat prohibition and a restriction.

**Royal Funeral Cost \$162,400**

**LONDON (AP)** — The funeral of King George VI cost 58,600 pounds (\$162,400).

The government presented the bill to Parliament Wednesday, asking it to vote the necessary money.

The total includes 8,900 pounds (\$22,400) for entertaining royal and overseas guests, hiring cars and railway expenses.

Biggest item was a bill from the armed forces for 35,750 pounds (\$100,010) for the troops who took part in the ceremonies.

That does not include their pay—only special costs resulting from the royal funeral on Feb. 15.

**Teen-Ager On Most Wanted List**

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The FBI's "most wanted" list was revised Wednesday to include a teen-ager, the youngest person ever placed among the nation's 10 top fugitives.

He is 19 year old Kenneth Lee Maurer of Detroit, sought for the bludgeoned deaths of his mother and 11-year old sister in Detroit's Rouge Park section last Nov. 26.

Maurer went on the "most wanted" list as a replacement for Willie Sutton, long sought for bank robbery in Brooklyn and captured by police there Feb. 18.

## Churchill Wins Vote Of Confidence As Socialist Wing Loses Smear Battle

**LONDON (AP)** — Prime Minister Churchill won a House of Commons confidence vote on his foreign policy Tuesday night after asserting his pledge of "prompt, resolute and effective" action in Korea only continued policies.

He disclosed also that the Labor regime of Prime Minister Attlee secretly set up a plan for regular production of atomic bombs and had produced an atom bomb.

Churchill won the "confidence vote" 318 to 283, a margin of 35 votes. Liberal party backer: swelled his nominal Conservative edge of 11 votes.

His revelations on Korean policy and the atom bomb came, Churchill said, from cabinet documents which he had no choice as he until his Conservative party ousted the Laborites in last October's general election.

His disclosure brought confusion and anger among the Laborites. This may sharpen the division between such moderate leaders as Attlee and Herbert Morrison and the left wing faction led by former Labor Minister Aneurin Bevan.

The confidence vote came on a Labor "censure" motion, accusing Churchill of making secret military pledges to President Truman. Socialist critics charged these pledges were hinted at when Churchill promised in a speech to Congress last month that Britain would take "prompt, resolute and effective" action if a Korea truce were reached, then broken by the Communists.

Churchill denied any secret agreement with the President.

He said Attlee's agreement reached a secret military understanding with the United States last May to take joint action "outside Korea" if Communist planes badly blasted U.N. forces from Chinese bases.

Churchill said Attlee was justified in making such arrangements.

**NEW ORLEANS (AP)** — The "widest main street in the world" was almost empty as New Orleans marked the end of carnival season with Ash Wednesday observances of the beginning of the 40 fast days of Lent.

Thousands who enjoyed the madness of Mardi Gras wended their quiet ways to church to have their forehead marked with the ashes of last Palm Sunday's palms.

About 130 worried over police charges filed against them during Tuesday's fun and frolic that was replete with parades, dancing, masking and general fun-making.

Police said it was an unusually orderly celebration; usually about 500 persons are arrested on Mardi Gras.

Canal Street, which the Chamber of Commerce publicizes as the widest main street in the world, had little traffic. Many celebrators slept late; others had already left; shoppers were few.
