## Red Cross Board Maps Drive Gains

A novel and striking progress board in the Gun Store window on Main Street will show daily standings of the six divisions in the Klamath Red Cross membership drive now under way.

Quotas of the six drive divisions add up to a \$25,000 goal set for this year.

The progress board depicts the division drives as an airplane race toward the 100 per cent mark. The race course is across 10 graduated circles with the 100 per cent mark in the center. Six small planes will be moved up on the board daily according to progress of the divisions they represent.

Outside the big circle are pictures of the six division heads. The Advance Gifts division, directed by Wes Lorenz, is off to a big lead but that was expected since this division collects many donations before the drive actually gets under way.

Of this morning the division racers shaped up like this: Advance Gifts (Wes Lorenz), 40 per cent; Business (Roy Murphy), 22 per cent; Industrial (O. K. Puckett), 17 per cent; Rural (Herb Polard and Jim Emmons), 6 per cent; Special Groups (Carroll Howe and John Heyden) 1 per cent; Residential (Mrs. George Clark), zero.

Donations accounting for the above percentages were practically all unsolicited. When the door-to-door campaign gets under way, the tail-end divisions are expected to move up quickly.

## Youth Again Panel Subject

"Build the Basin" polls have shown the Basin citizens consider youth our greatest potential resource. How tomorrow's adults mature and develop has great bearing on what our country will be to determine whether or not youth is but a dormant power which potentially could be directed into constructive activity, the next "Build the Basin" series will study the topic "How Can Youth Best Contribute Toward Building the Basin?"

A panel half of students and half of adults has been selected to null the questions and problems of putting tomorrow's college paper on an active participation basis in the community today.

Originally, a full panel of young people, representing all levels of thinking from the city, the county and even from further points had been considered.

However, the point-of-view of parents and others was added as a stimulus to draw out deeper convictions and ideas from panel members.

As in the past, the facilities of The Herald and News and radio station KFLW have been set aside for the series. The panel will take to the air on a broadcast at 8:30 p. m. Monday, and if past programs on youth problems have been any indication, this one, too, will carry a full hour and a half—30 minutes longer than "Build the Basin" programs are scheduled.

In fact, no "Build the Basin" program has yet been contained within its originally scheduled one hour limits.

A full audience participation is expected from this series; youth topics to date have topped all others in concentrated interest of Basin citizens.

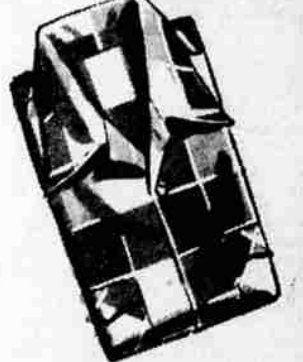
