### HST Strength Wanes In South As Russell Looms In Picture; Ike Slipping

Pulse-taking in the presidential campaigns brought reports Saturday of weakening in President Truman's strength in the South and a slowing of Gen. Eisenhower's bandwagon in New Hampshire.

It also was evident that the entry of Sen. Russell of Georgia into the Democratic race had sapped much of the power of Sen. Keenan of Tennessee in the South.

Jack Bell, Associated Press political writer, said Russell was a serious threat to any hopes Truman might have. The President has said he won't disclose for at least a month whether he plans to run.

### Lawyer Makes Cheat Charge

PORTLAND — An attorney told a judge Friday that he thought his two Indian clients had been defrauded in a timberland sale transaction.

The attorney, Leroy L. Lomax, reported to Probate Judge Ashby F. Miller that the two Indians—Joseph Grant and Harold F. Lomax—had sold their Curry County property for \$125,000. The property was then resold by another Indian and then optioned for \$300,000.

The original sale was approved by some officials of the Portland office of the Indians Affairs Bureau.

Two employees of the bureau earlier this week were released from their duties until they can answer formal charges against them involving land sale irregularities.

Lomax said he planned to have the sale set aside. Judge Dickson told him, "if these Indians have been cheated I want you to recover for them whatever they may have lost."

### Rogue Timber To Be Sold

A small sale of Rogue River National Forest timber is scheduled to be made at the Klamath Falls forest office next Thursday afternoon.

Sealed bids will be received until 2 p. m. that day.

The timber is located on about 60 acres a short distance northwest of Pelican guard station. The stand includes an estimated 87,000 board feet of ponderosa pine, 148,000 board feet of Douglas fir and 122,000 feet of white fir and other species.

Minimum acceptable bids are \$27.25 per thousand on the ponderosa, \$1.90 on Douglas fir and \$1 a thousand on the rest. In addition, a deposit of \$1 a thousand is required for slash disposal and \$3 a thousand for reforestation.

### Dancers Plan '52 Jamboree

April 2 has been selected as the date for the 1952 Square Dance Jamboree, sponsored by the Klamath Basin Square Dance Callers and Instructors Council, and this year a "big name" caller has been scheduled for appearance here.

Top Caller Les Gotcher, a Southern California, has been secured by the Council for the Jamboree, and now a hall of sufficient size is the chief worry of the sponsors. Location of the affair and starting time will be announced later.

Charles Kerr was recently elected president of the Callers Council, Tom Orr vice president and Mrs. Charles Kerr secretary-treasurer.

### Eight Greek Spies To Die

ATHENS, Greece — A court martial Saturday sentenced to death eight members of a 29 member spy ring.

Four others were sentenced to life imprisonment.

The prosecution had asked the death sentence for 12.

The military tribunal's verdict finished one of the most sensational espionage cases ever tried in Greek courts.

Eight of the 29 persons accused of spying and high treason were women. Their trial began Feb. 15.

Government witnesses produced codes, radio equipment seized last November, and copies of wireless messages for Cominform head and other Communist stations surrounding Greece in their cases against the conspirators.

The testimony said highly secret military information was reaching the Communists.

### Steelhammer Eyes Office

SALEM — John F. Steelhammer, Salem attorney and speaker of the State House of Representatives, said Saturday he would be a candidate for the Republican nomination for attorney general.

Steelhammer, who has served 12 years in the House from Marion County, said he would file Monday.

Two other Republicans — Leonard Lindas, Clackamas County district attorney, and E. O. Stader, Deschutes County district attorney — already have filed for the nomination.

Attorney General George Neuner, a Republican, has announced he will not seek re-election.

State Rep. Robert Thornton of Tillamook said Saturday he would seek the Democratic nomination for the post. He is the first Democrat to announce for a major state office.

### Spud Report Heard By Rotarians

The Klamath Falls Rotary Club lined various of its members Friday to raise \$425.00 as the start of a Rotary YMCA Equipment Fund. When the fund is complete the Rotary Youth Service committee will buy needed equipment for the new Y plant here. It was announced by President Warren Bennett.

This action was taken following a report, "Inside Washington," by Scott Warren, vice president of the club and chairman of the Oregon Potato Commission, who was a delegate to Washington on potato matters recently.

"The OPS action on potatoes was politics all the way through—first, last and always," Warren said.

He pointed out that, after steel workers demanded wage increases on Dec. 28, potatoes were singled out for a counter move to "keep the cost of living down."

Although potato prices had gone only 5 per cent above parity while other farm products had gone over as much as 80 per cent, potatoes were made the goat on "cost getting" basis.

The OPS order was drawn up without consulting anyone in the potato industry. As a result it was, and still is, doing nothing but causing a situation and providing employment for several thousand more OPS officials.

The OPS is sensitive to spring potato planting activities, and that is why there have been some amendments to the order—to reassure potato areas where planting decisions come early, he said.

Tommy Watters was chairman of the day.

### Silver Lumber Company Sold

The Silver Lumber Company plant on the Greensprings is being bought by Puckett and Scherer.

O. K. Puckett said the transaction included the sawmill, the planing mill and between 5,000,000 and 6,000,000 feet of timber east of the summit of the mountain.

On the part of the owners of the Silver company, Cal Peyton, said timber under contract to the firm west of the summit would be sold into Medford.

The silver mill is located just over the county line in Jackson County, but its lumber has been shipped out of Klamath Falls. The mill was built in 1928 and has been owned by Peyton, William Bullard of Klamath Falls and Ike Stenerson of Salt Lake City since 1946.

It has been operating one shift a day, with a 50,000 board feet capacity.

Puckett and Earl Scherer operate a mill at Keno. The price of the Silver mill sale was not disclosed.
