Feed Grains Again Show Some Advance

CHICAGO (AP)—Feed grains made modest advances on the board of trade Saturday in a continuation of the preceding session's rally.

Brokers thought the upturn, both Friday and Saturday, was based largely on the fact corn and oats had been pretty thoroughly liquidated.

Wheat continued to lag, held back by forecasts for light moisture in the winter wheat belt.

Wheat closed unchanged to 1/4 higher, March \$2.53 1/2-3/4, corn 1/2 higher, March \$1.77 1/2-3/4, soybeans 1/4 higher, May \$1.97 1/2-3/4, soybeans 1/4 higher, March \$2.27 1/2-3/4, and lard 3/4 to 10 cents higher, March \$24.75-80.

Stock Market On Dull Side Today

NEW YORK (AP)—Gold mining issues excited a glimmer of buying interest Saturday in the stock market, but otherwise the market was narrowly mixed and extremely dull.

Prices changed only fractionally with a few exceptions, and many leaders simply were not traded at all.

McIntyre Porcupine Mines which also has oil investments, was up around 3 points and was comparatively active.

Both Dome Mines and Homestake Mining advanced between 1 and 2 points.

Trading amounted to an estimated 450,000 shares, less than average for a two-hour session.

Power Curb Rules Eased

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Defense Electric Power Administration Friday relaxed its order which restricted the use of electric power in the Pacific Northwest.

The order became effective Sept. 17 after drought conditions threatened a power shortage.

James F. Fairman, defense electric power administrator, said it now "appears that there is no further need for a curtailment order at least until next fall."

In a letter to all electric utilities in the area Fairman also said: "This action should not be misunderstood as indicating that the Pacific Northwest will have no future power problems."

The Pacific Northwest approached the winter of 1951-52 with a possible average shortage of 600,000 kilowatts under adverse water conditions.

For the winter 1952-53, the Pacific Northwest faces the same shortage hazard.

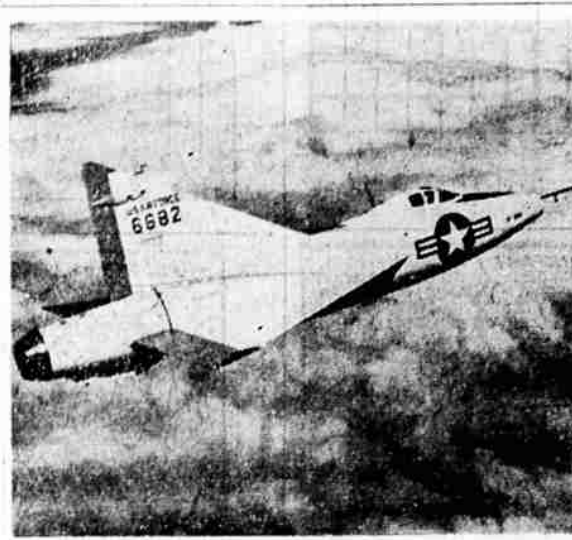
Fairman said a restrictive order is being considered for next fall and winter and recommendations are being asked from utilities in the area.

A Klamath Falls woman, Mrs. Ed (Florence) Poppe, about 40 years old, of 1029 Kane St., was killed in a two-car hit and run accident, Friday afternoon 43 miles east of Lovelock, Nev., on U. S. Highway 40, according to information received here.

Mrs. Poppe was returning with her husband to Klamath Falls from Cheyenne, Wyo., when the accident occurred, Sheriff A. C. Seeban of Lovelock said the woman died within 15 minutes of the accident from severe chest injuries.

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Taxes Too High, So Store Folds

RAYMOND, Wash. (AP)—Lapinski's Grocery started a clearance sale Friday in preparation for closing the store.

In announcing that the store was quitting business, a full page advertisement over the signature of Peter, Paul and George Lapinski appeared in the Raymond Herald.

"This is my reason for selling a business that is successful and not in debt," the advertisement said.

"My business has increased \$100,000 over last year. When the tax man figured out the amount I owe the government, here is what he told me:

"I hit the 60 per cent bracket which means for every dollar in profit I have to pay an income tax of 60 cents. This means I have to pay \$20,000 more for the year 1951. Then, on top of this, I have to pay a penalty for not estimating correctly for the \$100,000 increase in business.

"For every day of the year, including Sundays and holidays, my income tax for 1951 averaged \$52. That's not all the taxes I have paid. The State of Washington received from me for 1951 a total of \$1,069.70. The state calls it excise tax. Do not confuse it with sales tax.

"With such a tax load I am not able to accumulate any reserve there is no incentive to be in business any longer."
