Noted Artist Dies At 79

NEW YORK (AP)—Howard Chandler Christy, 79, magazine illustrator and portrait painter, died Monday of a heart ailment after a two-month illness.

He had spent much of a life-time portraying the American Civil War. His canvas beauties were famous as illustrations for magazines and books.

He also painted portraits of some of the world's best known people of his time, among them Presidents Harding and Coolidge.

He also portrayed the American servicemen in both world wars.

Funeral services will be held Thursday. Burial will be in Westchester County, N. Y.

Elliott To Attend Meet

Sid Elliott, manager of J. C. Penney Company department store, left here today to attend the company's Golden Jubilee convention being held in San Francisco from March 5 to 7.

House Cuts Truman Bills

WASHINGTON (AP)—The first of the administration's new appropriation bills was through the House Tuesday with budget-cutters boasting a minor victory.

They imposed a 2 per cent in two of the President's budget requests.

Passed by voice vote late Monday and sent to the Senate, the bill would appropriate \$3,438,565,000 to finance the Treasury and Post-Office Departments for the fiscal year starting July 1.

It leaves unchanged a permanent law under which the Treasury administers \$12,245,990,506 in indefinite funds, such as interest on the national debt and old age trust money.

The 2 per cent cut included \$72,680,000 made on recommendation of the House Appropriations Committee and \$3,890,000 imposed by the House itself. The total reduction was \$48,280,000 in Treasury and \$23,300,000 in Postoffice funds. The President requested \$693,045,000 for the Treasury and \$2,822,100,000 for the Post-Office Department.

River Blasts Kill Sturgeon

THE DALLES (AP)—Contractors dynamited the Columbia River last weekend for construction of the proposed dam at the Dalles.

And Monday the State of Oregon was in the caviar business.

Eight sturgeon, containing almost 150 pounds of eggs—from which caviar is made—were killed in the blast. The eggs may sell for as much as \$8 a pound. And the fish, almost half a ton of it, sells for 80 cents a pound.

The Fish Commission, which has claimed the sturgeon, will sell it to the highest bidder.

Largest of the eight fish killed in the blast was 12 feet long. It weighed about 600 pounds and was about 60 years old.

Portland Doctor Up On Tax Court

PORTLAND (AP)—A Portland chiropractor, already facing charges of manslaughter by abortion, was accused Monday of income tax evasion.

He is Ross Elliott. The U.S. Internal Revenue Department said that he reported \$13,636 income in 1945 instead of \$28,778.

Tax liens of \$877,620 were filed against Elliott and his wife last year by the government. Various years since 1941 were covered by the liens.

Elliott was one of several arrested on manslaughter charges last July after a series of raids on Portland clinics. He has not yet been brought to trial.

Reno Theft No Bother To Loser

RENO (AP)—L. V. Redfield, who says he is "a man of character but not a character," still is unconcerned over the loss of an estimated \$2,500,000 in cash, jewelry and negotiable securities.

As police checked rumors and listened to a multitude of theories as to how burglars carried away Redfield's safe from his home Friday, the 54-year old millionaire told reporters:

"Money can be replaced.

"There are many things in life that are more important than money. I have good health; I have a good wife and, with apologies to the song—I have her love to keep me warm—who can ask for anything more."

Then he philosophized on thrift:

"I buy a bargain when I see one. If I can save a nickel on an item, I buy it in quantity, thus saving one or two dollars. If I hadn't done that all my life, I'd be just like so many other people today—just one step ahead of the bill collector."

"I can say that I don't owe a cent to anyone in the world, including Uncle Sam. If the internal revenue people will check their files, they'll find I have paid income taxes on far more money than was taken the other day."

The burglars didn't "break" Redfield. They overlooked another \$1,000,000 in securities.

Reno Police Chief L. R. Greeson was not as talkative.

All he would say about the robbery was:

"We're checking and chasing leads. If we were getting close, we couldn't make it public anyway."

Peace Hope Seen By Ambassador

LOS ANGELES (AP)—"I believe Russia will fall because men will be free," but we must not underestimate Soviet power, says Adm. Alan G. Kirk.

Kirk, who resigned last month as U.S. ambassador to the Soviet Union, also said in a Town Hall address Monday America would be foolish to consider Russia invincible.

He said he believes war can be avoided if America is able to "negotiate from strength, actual and in being."

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Columbia River Bill Gets Okay

WASHINGTON (AP)—Legislation authorizing seven western states to negotiate a compact for division of the Columbia River and its tributaries was approved by the House Monday.

States concerned are Washington, Idaho, Oregon, Montana, Nevada, Utah and Wyoming. A committee report said the seven are believed willing to negotiate such an agreement.

Congress and Legislatures of the states must approve any compact for use of the river.

The bill now goes to the Senate.

O'Daniel May Be In Race

PORTLAND (AP)—W. Lee O'Daniel, a former governor of Texas, told the Oregonian Monday that he will not become a candidate for President in the State's May 16 primary.

O'Daniel, a Democrat, said last night that he might become a candidate.

Reached by telephone at his home in Dallas, Tex., O'Daniel told the Oregonian he "wished it had been possible for him to enter," but that he would have too late a start in the race.

He said he hadn't give up the idea of running elsewhere, though.

"We still may get into this campaign," O'Daniel said. "There is a strong demand . . . including many letters from Oregon. Petitions are rolling in fast."

O'Daniel, who served two terms in the U.S. Senate from Texas, campaigned under the slogan "Pass the Biscuits, Pappy." He retired from politics in 1948 when he did not seek re-election for his Senate post.

Lumber Shipping Figure Gaining

PORTLAND (AP)—Lumber shipments from Oregon ports during January exceeded those for the same period last year by almost 20 million board feet, the Pacific Lumber Inspection Bureau reported Monday.

Columbia River ports handled 47,147,000 feet this January compared with 37,790,000 for January 1951.

Oregon coastal shipments were up to \$3,743,000 feet compared with 33,769,000 a year ago.

Puget Sound ports' volume dropped from 29,039,000 feet this year to 26,777,000 last year. Grays Harbor and Willapa Harbor shipments were down to 17,310,000 feet from 26,388,000. British Columbia shipments also slumped from 103,941,000 to 82,022,000 feet.

Communist Leaders Get Trial Delay

NEW YORK (AP)—Sixteen secondary Communist leaders have won a delay in their trial until March 31.

They were to have gone on trial Monday, but Federal Judge Edward J. Dinocor granted their plea for a postponement so they can have more time to plan their defense.

Patients Get Hospital Veto

SALEM (AP)—Two male patients, accused of failure to observe rules, were dismissed from the State Tuberculosis Hospital here.

G. C. Bellinger, hospital superintendent, said the men, both with contagious tuberculosis, were dismissed two weeks ago for smoking, failure to take proper rest and general violations.

Dr. Willard J. Stone, Marion County health officer, said one of the men had since been committed to the State Mental Hospital for treatment.

The other, who came from Sweet Home, is at large.

Bellinger said the state had no authority to compel the men to submit to treatment or to observe hospital rules.
