Over Crime Probe Issue

WASHINGTON (A — Aity. Gen. McGrath's national racketeering aurvey has run into some difficulties as a result of questions raised by U.S. Judges on how far federal grand juries can legally go.

Specifically, it is reported that some judges have doubts that a jury convened under U.S. authority can inquire into strictly local offenses.

Others are concerned about possible "rumaway juries" which may go far affeld in any blanket inquiry such as that proposed into general crime conditions.

Some judges want to know just what and how much of traditionally secret grand jury proceedings may be made public in the form of "presentments", or general statements of conditions.

McGrath launched the nationwide incomments of the statements of the statement

sentments", or general statements of conditions.

McGrath launched the nationwide inquiry into organized crime and racketeering activities early in January, as a followup to the work of the Kefauver Crime Investigating Committee.

He called for jury sessions in each of the 93 Federal Judicial Districts.

A check Wednesday showed that juries have been convened or called in only about half of the 93 Districts. Transcripts of proceedings have been received here from only three.

Rufus McLean, who heads the Rufus McLean, who heads the Justice Department racket unit assigned to sift the jury reports, said, however, the program is proceeding with jury sessions called or convened in 47 Districts,
According to McLean's records, sessions have been or are being held at many cities, including Juncau, Anchorage, and Fairbanks. Aleska and Seattle, Wash.

McLean said a jury also has been called for March 24 at Spokane, Wash.

Fish License **Issue Raised**

Ad Campaign WASHINGTON (**— Officials of the Fish and Wild Life Service said Tuesday a Supreme Court ruining that Alaska cannot charge 10 times as much for a non-resident fishing license as it does for a resident license may possibly affect many states.

Milton C. James, acting director of the service, and Doald J. Chancey, its general counsel, told a reporter that in many states hunting or fishing licenses for non-residents were priced considerably higher than those for residents.
