### Orders Cut Off Supply In Tax Case

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Truman Friday ordered government agencies to refuse requests from a House investigating committee for data on cases they have referred to Atty. Gen. J. Howard McGrath for prosecution.

Mr. Truman, objecting to what he termed a "dragnet approach" to the committee's investigation of how McGrath has conducted the Justice Department, said "it would be impractical and unwise for the departments and agencies to endeavor to comply with that request."

The Justice Department itself refused on Wednesday to give such information to a House judiciary subcommittee headed by Rep. Cheli (D-Ky.).

The group had asked for data on the disposal of cases referred to the department over a six-year period.

It proposes to look into charges that the department, under McGrath, has been lax in prosecution of certain tax cases, some of them involving big-time gamblers and racketeers.

Mr. Truman's attitude was set out in a letter to Cheli. The President had copies of the letter circulated to all department heads with an accompanying note giving the letter the effect of an order to them.

The White House gave news reporters copies of the letter after Mr. Truman had left for a visit to Key West, Fla.

### Lattimore Hearing Off

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Internal Security subcommittee called off Friday's session with Owen Lattimore because of the absence of several members.

Chairman McCarran (D-Nev.) told Lattimore, Johns Hopkins professor and writer on Far Eastern affairs, to come back Monday morning for his tenth day of questioning.

The subcommittee is searching for subversive influences in U.S. foreign policy.

McCarran said Sen. Smith (D-N.C., O'Connor (D-Md.) and Eastland (D-Miss.), members of the investigating subcommittee, had to be away on official business.

### Federal "Cleanup" Boss' Name Linked To Deal In Surplus Oil Tanker Trade

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senators digging into oil trade with Red China developed testimony Friday that a foundation headed by Newbold Morris, now government corruption cleanup man, could have barred the oil deliveries.

Houston H. Wasson, law partner of Morris, acknowledged to the Senate Investigations subcommittee that this was within the power of the China International Foundation, Inc.

Wasson also testified that his and Morris' law firm has received about \$15,000 in fees for legal services from two companies which engaged in China trade.

With this testimony, the committee recessed until Monday. It announced that Morris will be called to the witness chair on Tuesday. Monday's witness is to be Col. Arthur G. Syran.

The hearings have developed that protests from Syran, then an official of the Economic Co-Operation Administration, brought the oil trade to a halt.

One member of the subcommittee, Sen. Mundt (R-S.D.), has denounced the trade as for "blood soaked profits," and with Friday's testimony Sen. Nixon (R-Calif.) told Wasson:

"The morality concerned... is about the equal of that of international pirates."

Morris is president and Wasson is secretary and treasurer of the foundation, incorporated as a non-profit charitable organization.

The foundation owns stock—and Wasson said "controlled"—United Tanker Corp., a shipping firm whose vessels carried oil to Communist China up until about two months before the outbreak of the Korean War.

The war began June 25, 1950 (Korean time) but it was some five months later before the Chinese Reds entered the fighting.

Questioned as to whether the foundation could have barred United Tanker from making the oil hauls, Wasson said, "If China International had said, 'We are strongly opposed to making these charters,' they would not have been made."

He added that the decision was left to United Tanker.

Wasson was before the senators for the third day. Members of the subcommittee indicated that before they close their inquiry they expect to get into reports of high-profit trade in which rich Americans and Chinese nationalists sold other goods to Red China, even after the start of the Korean War.

The current inquiry, originally concerned with huge profits reaped on deals in war surplus oil tankers, already has branched out to cover 1. A statement by Sen. McCarthy

# Bleachers Collapse Minutes Before Ice Show Opens; 275 Injured; Investigation On

BALTIMORE (AP) — Top state and city officials Friday began a thorough investigation into the collapse of a section of bleachers at an ice show Thursday night.

At least 275 persons were injured, 32 of them seriously.

Gov. Theodore R. McKeldin of Maryland, who addressed a meeting in New York Thursday night, was one of the early arrivals at the Fifth Regiment armory, barnlike site of the accident. With him was State Engineer Nathan Smith.

Paul Hollister, a public works director assigned by Mayor Thomas D'Alesandro to make a "full and complete" survey, said both the city and state groups would go through the wreckage "limber by limber and joint by joint."

The section of bleachers gave way at 8:25 p.m., a few minutes before Sonja Henie's ice revue was to begin its opening appearance. About 7,000 people were in the big building.

LOUD ROAR

Just as the rink lights went on and the band struck up a tune there came a sickening crunch that grew into a loud roar as the back section of seats dropped into a tangled mass of broken timbers and falling arms and legs.

Miss Henie's manager said the stands were erected by a contracting firm headed by Ed Coronati of Westfield, N. J., described as a veteran in constructing that type of stands for circuses, fairs and similar events. He has erected similar stands at the same armory before.

The city's building inspector, Paul Cohen, declined to issue a permit for the seating because the stands were not completely erected when his office inspected the site Thursday afternoon.

However, a city permit is not mandatory because the state has jurisdiction over the armory. No state permit is necessary.

Spectators said uprights still were being nailed in place while the audience was streaming into the stands.

PAID JOB

Cohen said after a hasty inspection of the collapsed section "it was obvious to me that these rows of seats were in addition to the seats usually installed. They were evidently erected in haste and in a hasty manner. They were not properly braced and the uprights were not nailed securely."

He refused to lay the responsibility, saying "that's a matter for investigations."

Miss Henie canceled the performance and said ticket holders could have a refund or attend another show Monday night.

Police estimated about 600 persons were seated in the section which collapsed.

Hospitals sent out emergency calls for doctors as ambulances brought the bleeding and bruised victims in for treatment.

Families were separated and anxious fathers and mothers raced from one of ten hospitals to another in search of injured relatives.

There were angry comments from the injured.

Eugene Shriver, of Riverdale, Md., stood over his wife whose dress was blood-soaked and said "I wish somebody's going to pay for this."

## Morse Asks Congressmen To OK Construction Of Hells Canyon Dam Unit

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress was asked Friday by Sen. Morse (R-Ore.) to authorize construction of Hells Canyon dam on the Snake River.

The big dam would cost an estimated \$356,810,000.

It would straddle the Snake at a point where the river forms the Idaho-Oregon boundary. Its generators would have a capacity of 900,000 kilowatts.

Hells Canyon dam is one of the most controversial of various Pacific Northwest power projects.

It has been recommended by the Department of Interior and Army Engineers, but has been opposed by Idaho's Governor Len Jordan and that state's congressional delegation.

The Columbia Basin Interagency Committee, made up of representatives of various northwest states, recently bypassed the issue entirely rather than provoke a possible split in its ranks.

Several times the dam has been urged by President Truman.

He has said he would ask Congress to vote money to build it as soon as the lawmakers decide it should be built.

Morse in remarks prepared for the Senate said he was "proud" to introduce the bill because the dam "will permanently enrich the people of all the Pacific Northwest states, and the nation." He compared its importance to Grand Coulee, Hoover and Shasta dams.

The bill would authorize construction of Hells Canyon dam, reservoir and power plant, and the building of Scraper Creek power house on the Payette unit of the Mountain Home Division. It would not authorize irrigation features of Mountain Home nor transmission lines for the Hells Canyon project.

It would reserve existing and prospective rights to water use for such purposes as irrigation, and withdrawal for sale to Idaho 300,000 kilowatts of power.

Another section would set up procedures by which Congress, at a later date, could authorize various other irrigation projects to be paid for in part by the surplus power revenues of Hells Canyon.

Hells Canyon dam would back up the Snake river waters 92 miles. It would have usable storage capacity of 3,800,000 acre feet.

The initial Creek plant would have installed capacity of 14,500 kilowatts. It would cost \$23,700,000.

Referring to proposals by the Idaho Power Co. to build five small dams in the Hells Canyon area, Morse said such action would be "wasteful" of natural resources.
