ASHLAND IF — Southern Oregon may be squeaked out of the Far Western conference—and right into the Oregon Collegiate Conference.

A meeting in San Francisco this weekend may decide the fate of the school, Dr. Elmo Stevenson, college president, said here.

He said California schools were meeting to decide whether to form a new conference, and it was not at all certain that Southern Oregon would be invited to join.

Southern Oregon is the only non-California member of the Far Western Conference.

If Southern Oregon is excluded, it will accept the long-standing offer to join the Oregon Collegiate Conference, he said.

Bonanza Wins 55-50 Nod From Chieftains

Teamwork outlasted a one-man show at Henley last night and today Bonanza and Rogue River each have one paw on a ticket to the Class B state tournament.

The two Dist. 5 teams will settle the quarrel Saturday night in Grants Pass.

Last night Bonanza had the team savvy and a 55-50 victory. Rogue River had big Jim Boulter, without whom the Chieftains would be just another Class B basketball club.

It was a game that rivaled Wednesday night's overtime thriller—won by Rogue River, 48-47—and a 5:00 crowd went away with more than their money's worth.

The game started Boulter in the first half, Bonanza's Irwin Crume in the second half, but the Antler forward had more help from his teammates.

Boulter scored the first 16 points checked up by Rogue River and it wasn't until Byron Kile dumped one with just 2:07 to go in the first half that Boulter's monopoly

was broken up.

But, while this was going on, Bonanza's Don Hubble and Maurice Chandler were pacing an Antler attack that gave the Klamath County champs a 28-22 halftime lead.

Boulter had 20 of the Chiefs' 22 points at intermission time.

The lead changed hands four times in the first quarter, Hubble giving Bonanza a 12-10 lead at the bell.

The Antlers—with the exception of two knots, 12-all and 14-all early in the second—kept the lead until late in the third when a long shot by James Wehren gave the Rogues a brief 37-35 lead. The Chiefs managed to tie it 31-all and 37-all in the third.

But Vernon Haley tied it up and Crume put Bonanza ahead again almost simultaneously with the third-quarter whistle, 39-37.

Crume was on the business end of a fast break at the fourth-quarter tip-off to put Bonanza in the lead, 41-37, and the Antlers kept at least a four-point lead the rest of the way.

Crume, who scored just three points in the first half, ended with 20, eleven of them coming when they counted in the last quarter.

Hubble clipped in with 16.

Boulter ended high with 22, sitting out the last half of the third and the first half of the fourth.

The only thing that kept the Rogues in the ball game the second half with Boulter grieving four personal fouls on the bench most of the time, were long shots by Wehren, Ralph Milton and Rhoten.
