**Rogue Survey Speedup Seen**

WASHINGTON (AP)—Investigation of development programs for the Rogue River area of Oregon will be speeded up according to Interior Secretary Oscar Chapman.

In a letter to Sen. Wayne Morse (R-Ore.), Chapman said a development plan proposed by Victor Boehl of the Rogue River Valley Irrigation Association is receiving particular attention.

The Boehl program modifies the original program proposed by the Bureau of Reclamation. The bureau's program for power and flood control would flood the river, destroying its fishing and injuring its tourist appeal, backers of the Boehl program said.

Chapman said it was the intention of his department to develop a comprehensive program that would give full consideration to the recreational aspects as well as power aspects of the Rogue's resources.

Roy Besey, chairman of the department's Pacific Northwest Field Committee, is studying other Rogue development proposals, Chapman wrote Morse.

**Cut Asked in US Budget**

WASHINGTON (AP)—A nine per cent cut in the \$1,089,542,625 President Truman asked in extra funds for more than a score of federal agencies was recommended by the House Appropriations Committee Friday.

The committee sent to the House floor for debate next week a bill approving \$970,192,943 of the amount sought.

The money was requested to supplement previous appropriations made to the agencies for the present fiscal year, ending next June 30.

More than a third of the new money is to foot the bill for pay raises voted by Congress last year for federal employees.

Another large chunk, \$285,800,000, is for veterans' benefits, including education and training and life insurance.

The money trimmed from the President's requests reflected a cut in funds for every agency except the House of Representatives itself. The \$114,395 budgeted for additional House expenses was hiked to \$120,285.

The committee approved an increase of 69 1/2 million dollars in funds for reimbursement to states under the federal-aid highway system.

This boosts to 418 million dollars the federal money available for the road program this fiscal year.

**3 File For Albany Court**

ALBANY, Ore. (AP)—Three candidates filed Friday for the judgeship of the new Albany district court.

They are Wendell Tompkins, Albany; Cecilia P. Galey, Sweet Home; and Kenneth Wilshire, Lebanon.

The post was created Friday by the Linn County court which replaced the Albany justice of the peace court with the new district court.

Justice of the Peace Harlow Weinrich was offered the \$5,700 a year post but he turned it down because it required him to give up his law practice.

District judges cannot have private practices while justices of the peace can.

Gov. McKay will fill the vacant judgeship by appointment until a judge is elected.

**CO's Must Work On State Program**

PORTLAND (AP)—Conscientious objectors are required to serve two years in some civilian work which will benefit the nation and Oregon Selective Service officials said Friday they were conducting a survey to line up jobs for them.

State and local agencies as well as hospitals have been asked to submit a list of jobs which conscientious objectors might fill, Col. Francis W. Mason, deputy director of Selective Service in Oregon, said.

The Army has set up a special center at Camp Carson, Colo., to train both dogs and their handlers for military use.

**Group Seeks Session Cut**

SALEM (AP)—The Oregon Legislature's Interim Committee on Legislative Procedure decided Friday to poll the legislators on what they think could be done to make the sessions shorter.

The 1951 session, longest in history, lasted 116 days.

The questionnaire to be sent to members of several former sessions as well as to those now serving, will ask whether they favor these ideas:

- Annual sessions instead of having sessions every two years.
- Meeting of the Ways and Means Committee, which makes appropriations, before the sessions meet.
- Barring introduction of bills after the 20th day.
- A powerful Rules Committee.
- Insistence that state departments introduce their bills early.
- Leaving afternoons free for committee meetings, thus holding legislative sessions only during the mornings.
- Having a voting machine to take House roll calls.
- Dispensing with roll calls on minor bills.
- Getting assistance from the State Bar in drafting bills.

A powerful Rules Committee, Sen. Thomas R. Mahoney, Portland Democrat, is chairman of the committee.

**ARRESTED**

PORTLAND (AP)—Fred J. Clemo, 58, a cashier for a state liquor store, was arrested here Thursday on a charge of theft of public money.

Clemo disappeared Feb. 25 with a shortage of \$4,219 in his books, George S. Woodworth, state liquor commission attorney, said.

**China Protest Called Bluff**

TOKYO (AP)—Chou En-Lai, premier and foreign minister of Communist China, declared Saturday that American planes have spread germs over Manchuria. He warned that fliers who are caught dropping germs will be "dealt with as war criminals."

Chou said American planes made 448 sorties over Manchuria between Feb. 29 and March 5 "to spread large numbers of germ-carrying insects."

The Communist Peiping Radio called Chou's statement an official protest. However, it did not say to whom the protest was addressed.

This was the latest in a long series of Communist propaganda broadcasts charging the United States with conducting "germ warfare" in the Korean conflict. The U.S. has branded the charges absurd.

**Eight Vie For Portland Mayor**

PORTLAND (AP)—The Portland mayoralty primary race will be a contest between eight persons.

Candidates, including those who filed Friday, are: Mayor Dorothy McCullough Lee, commissioner J. E. Bennett and Fred Peterson, insurance man Lew Wallace, barber Arnold Little, restaurateur Maurice Willinger, contractor Rue V. Kerley and tap dancing instructor Walter V. Spearley.

**Father, Son To Face Suit**

TACOMA (AP)—A Longview father and son are named as defendants in a \$51,000 suit brought by an Oregon man for injuries he says were incurred in an auto collision in April, 1950.

Harry Sparks Sr. and Harry R. Sparks are defendants in the suit. Louis W. Vincent, the plaintiff, charges that the younger Sparks was driving his father's car at the time it hit a car in which he was riding on the Ft. Canby Road in Pacific County.

**Kidnaper Gets 15 Year Sentence**

PORTLAND (AP)—A Portland man Friday pleaded guilty to kidnaping and was sentenced to 15 years in prison.

He is George Lester Womack, 28. He was accused of kidnaping Mrs. Edith Sterns of Portland. Another man, now serving time in a Georgia state prison, is accused of being an accomplice in the kidnaping. Mrs. Sterns was held prisoner in a wooded area of Clackamas County while one of the men used her car. She was later released unharmed.

Womack was arrested in Georgia where he fled after the kidnaping.
