Bomb Blasts Wreck Homes

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Two bomb blasts set off simultaneously by timing devices heavily damaged a home occupied by a Negro family and another across the street that is soon to be rented to Negroes. The explosions early Sunday rocked the neighborhood but injured no one. The Negro family, William Bailey, 32, a teacher; his wife, Willis, 20, and their son, William, 12, were asleep when the blast wrecked their living and dining rooms. Bailey said they have lived in the house since January and have received no threats. Police said, however, the former owner had been warned not to sell the property to Negroes. In the other house were Ralph Martinez, 25, film studio worker, and John W. Potts, 32, restaurant owner. They said they were planning to move out shortly so a Negro family could move in. Negro families have been living in the Dunsuir Avenue area for a year, police said.

Woman Injured In Auto Accident

CANBY (AP) — Mrs. L. E. Parsons, wife of the manager of radio station KVAS, Astoria, was injured here early Sunday. She was a passenger in a car driven by her husband which collided with one driven by C. W. Jackson of Canby, state police reported. Jackson was later booked at the Clacamas County jail on a charge of driving while under the influence of liquor, officers said. Parsons suffered broken ribs, leg injuries, possible internal injuries and shock.

Honeymoon Spree Ends — In Prison

TOKYO (AP) — Two months ago Masakazu Owaki, 24, walked off his job with 2,000,000 yen (about \$5,000) belonging to the Teachers' Cooperative at Nagoya, for which he was cashier. Next day he got married, bought a house, started a spending spree and began playing the horses. The honeymoon ended Monday. Police arrested him. Owaki had only 4,000 yen (about \$11) left. He had spent the equivalent of 26 years' salary.

Winchell On Sick List

NEW YORK (AP) — Walter Winchell became ill just before air time last night and did not make his usual weekly broadcast over the American Broadcasting Company network. Winchell's remarks, as he had prepared them, were read by Richard Stark, who usually announces the program. The 54-year-old columnist's office said later that Winchell "against the advice of his doctors and the protest of Mrs. Winchell, prematurely returned to his work following a serious attack of virus infection." "He will duly resume after consultation with his physicians," the statement added. It was understood that the statement referred only to the radio program. The Daily Mirror, which publishes Winchell's syndicated column here, did not know of any immediate plans for him to stop writing. Winchell announced on Jan. 28 that his own doctor and a heart specialist had ordered him to take a rest. He returned to the air and resumed writing his column only a week ago.

BOATS LOST

TOKYO (AP) — The Maritime Safety Board of Hokkaido said Monday 318 Japanese boats were lost or damaged by tidal waves after the March 4 earthquake. Most were small fishing vessels. No direct casualties were involved, the board added.

Eskimo Ikes Press For Favorite Under Northern Lights; See Defense Goal

 NOME, Alaska (AP) — The farthest north "Ike for President" club is whooping it up for the general, though its members couldn't vote for him even if he should get the nomination. The Gen. Eisenhower boosters are Eskimos. But, as residents of Alaska, they couldn't vote in a presidential election even if they weren't. Nevertheless, hoping to promote their favorite for the nomination, they organized the Ike for President Club of Shishmaref — which is about 125 miles across Bering Strait from Russian Siberia. The general might be surprised if he heard what his Eskimo boosters are saying his election to the Presidency would mean for Alaska and the Eskimos. It's down in black and white just as though the general had dropped in to break blubber at a week-end political clamor (which he hasn't). The Eskimo Ike club ran a three-column advertisement in the Nome Nugget, proposing more clubs and stating: "Club membership should demand that Alaskan delegates to the Republican National Convention be instructed to vote for Ike." Then it got down to these specifics: "Ike, being President of the United States, means: "1. A better and more adequate defense system of all Alaska. A large garrison at Nome. A submarine base in Alaska. A large Naval force at Kotlik. "2. A highway from Fairbanks to Nome, (that's roughly 600 miles of wilderness); from Nome to Teller, to Lost River, to Wales. (These would be extensions, but no road to Shishmaref is mentioned). "3. Maintenance of a federal Judiciary court in Nome. "4. Establishment of new industries for Eskimos, so they can have all-year employment, better schools and new opportunities. "5. That gold mine operators should have a gold bonus price above the present \$35 per ounce." There were some other points, but those hit the highlights. Officers of the club are: Vincent J. Toekton, president; Alex Weylouna, vice president; Charlie Okpawruk, secretary. They cite Ike as a virtually a kindred Arctic soul as an honorary member of Igloo No. 1, Pioneers of Alaska.
