Community Concert Drive Ends With Rush As Full Membership Reported In

A lagging Community Concert membership drive suddenly caught fire in the final hours and closed Saturday evening with a record roll of 1450 memberships.

Friday morning, with only 800 members signed, outlook for the coming concert season was decidedly bleak. But campaigners launched a spirited rally that crashed through with 650 additional memberships Friday and Saturday.

This year's membership campaign was directed by Mrs. Fred Elders and Harriet Mueller, assisted by Lucille Schreiner, New York representative of the concert association. A crew of about 100 workers signed up members. Last night, jubilant concert officials heaped praise on the campaign directors and workers for their record-breaking drive. "It was just wonderful," said Concert Assoc. Pres. Louis Mann.

Immediately following the end of the drive Saturday evening, concert association directors sat down with Miss Schreiner and scheduled next season's concert offerings. There are to be four concerts: October, the Longine Symphonettes; December, the DePaup Infantry Chorus; January, the Ballet Ruse de Monte Carlo Concert Company; March, David Lloyd, tenor.

The 30-piece Longine Symphonette, directed by Michael Piastre, has four times been selected by U.S. and Canadian newspaper music critics as the "foremost concert ensemble".

The DePaup Infantry Chorus, comprised of 30 Negro veterans of World War Two, appeared here a few seasons ago. The chorus is to close Portland's current concert season in an appearance there March 25.

The Monte Carlo Ballet's concert group is, of course, world famed. Two pianists accompany the group.

David Lloyd is a young tenor who has been winning growing acclaim from critics. He has appeared with the Boston Symphony and sang two seasons with the New York City Opera Company.

Actual dates for the four concerts are to be announced later.

Steel Outlook Held Better

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government said Monday it has "substantial" amounts of steel, copper and aluminum on hand for building commercial projects in the last half of 1952. It invited contractors to put in bids for new construction jobs.

Manly Fleischmann, head of the Defense Production Administration, said major increases in allotments of the hitherto scarce materials will go to highway, school and hospital builders starting July 1.

He indicated that practically all applications now pending for industrial and commercial structures will be approved. The DPA boss said that under the new program it is possible that the freeze on building of new television stations may soon be ended. He pointed out that such action would require a ruling by the Federal Communications Commission, which has put a ban on building of new TV facilities.
