Allbough the Klamath Red Cross funds drive is more than half over and less than half the goal has been reached, officials and drive workers, continue to be optimistic. mons' problems and made plans to give them an assist. As of this morning, the Rural Division had turned in but \$357 to-ward a quota of \$5,000. Overall collections this morning totaled \$10,236, amounting to ap-proximately \$1 per cent of the \$25,000 goal. This is how the six divisions of the drive shaped up this morning: Advanced gifts, quote \$2,500, col-lections \$1,709, 68 per cent; Real-dential, quota \$2,500, collections \$1,621, 65 per cent; Industrial, quota \$4,500, collections \$2,689, 60 per cent; Special Groups, quota quota 34,300, concettons 32,000, ou per cent: Special Groups, quota 32,000, collections 3850, 48 per cent; Business, quota 38,500, collections 32,2889, 34 per cent; and Rural quota 35,000, collections 3378, 8 per

cent. This year's drive is running sub-stantially ahead of last year's, with collections almost \$2,000 ahead of the same lime last year. Fays Smith, regional Red Cross field representative, told the direc-tors yeaterday she believed the drive here was progressing as fa-vorably as drives in other area chapters.
