GI's Rush To Marry Jap Brides Before Deadline

TOKYO (AP)—Hundreds of American servicemen married Japanese girls Wednesday—just in time to beat the deadline for taking their bride brides home to the United States.

James B. Plicher, U.S. consul general, estimated the last-day rush of civil ceremonies at six consular offices increased the number of servicemen legally married to Japanese to about 8,000.

An accurate count will not be available for days.

Servicemen had to be married by 2 p.m. to benefit from a law which enables them to take their Oriental brides to the U.S.

Ninety-five soldiers, sailors and Marines were married at the Tokyo consulate. Similar numbers stood beside their fiancées at consular offices in Yokohama, Nagoya, Kobe, Fukuoka and Sapporo and said "I do" to this question:

"Do you solemnly swear that according to the laws of your state you are of legal marriageable age and there is no hindrance, legal or otherwise, to your uniting in marriage with this girl?"

Some of the couples planned religious ceremonies later, but most did not.

Most of the bridegrooms were based in Japan. Some were on leave from Korea. A few came on furloughs from the U.S.

Air Force Cpl. John W. Amerson of Olympia, Wash., and Teruko Maeoka were the last couple married at the Tokyo consulate.

Many of the couples brought children. Some were born out of wedlock but most were born with the benefit of a Japanese marriage ceremony.

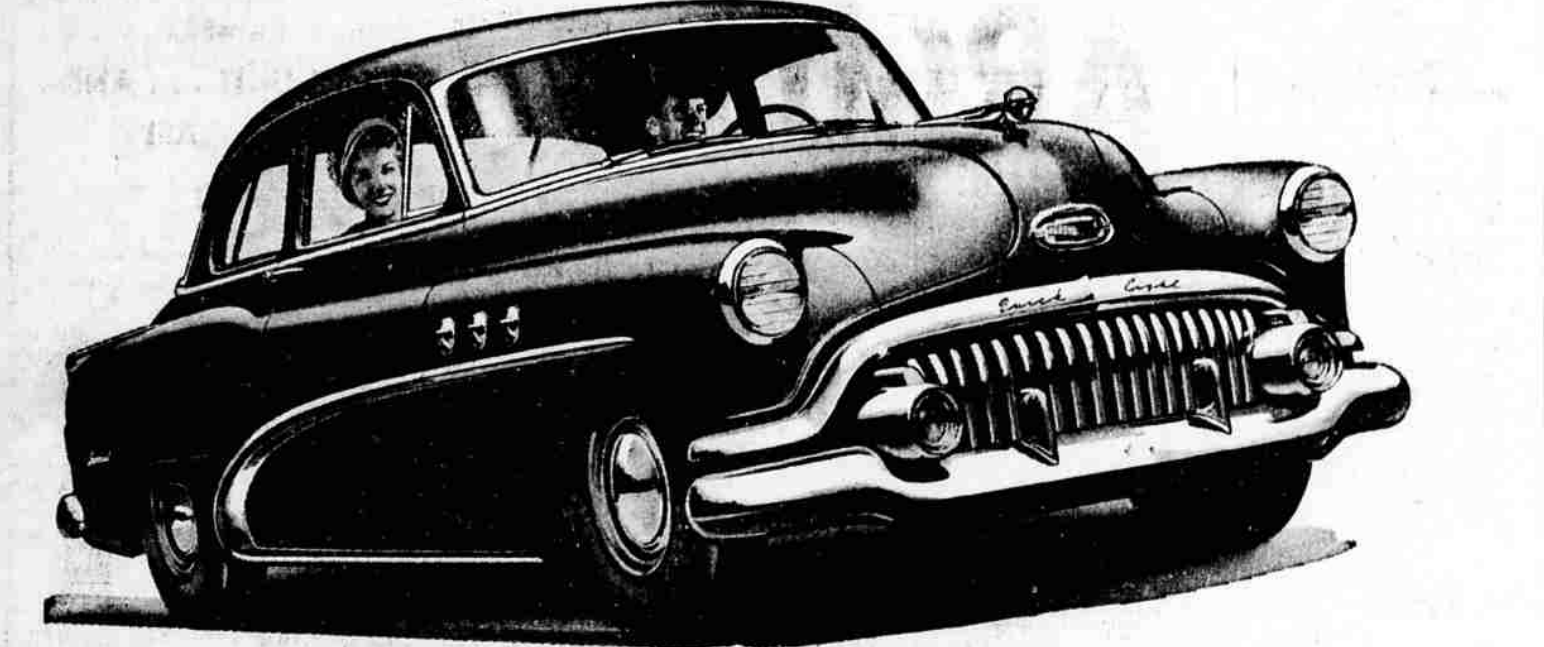

Dam Study Fund Asked

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House Appropriations Committee will recommend \$25,000 for a Reclamation Bureau study of a possible third power house for Grand Coulee Dam, Rep. Jackson (D-Wash.), predicted Wednesday.

President Truman's budget proposed only \$125,000 for the purpose, Jackson, a member of the committee, said he had urged an increase in the amount and that he had assurances his request would be granted.

The money would be used to continue geological drilling and engineering studies and to prepare preliminary designs and cost estimates.

The proposed third power house would add approximately a million kilowatts to the energy output of the huge Columbia River Dam.

Scholarships To Be Offered Soon

LEWIS AND CLARK COLLEGE, Portland—Several tuition scholarships will be available to Northwest teachers for the summer workshop in community studies to be conducted by Lewis and Clark college June 9 to July 18.

Dr. Edward G. Lindeman, internationally known educator and sociologist from Columbia University School of Social Work, will serve as consultant for the graduate study which will be the second phase of a survey of historic Oregon City, eight miles from the campus. Oregon City public schools will cooperate in the unique six-week project.

Dr. Lindeman will also serve as counselor for a second workshop in inter-group education which the Anti-Defamation League will conduct June 16 to July 3.
