

MINNEAPOLIS OF - Gen. Eisehower lost a little ground as rural returns from Minuszota's presiden-ital primary came in Wednesday, but with 2.733 of the state's 3,769 precincts reported he had garnered 38.52 per cent of the Republican vote.

The general got his votes the hard way — by write-ins — after a court ruling that pelitions were defective balked efforts of his supporters to get him on the ballot. Veteran politicians called the blizzard of write-ins amazing.
