Murder Jury **Hears** Case

CRESCENT CITY, Calif. (A) CRESCENT CITY, Calif. (m -Richard and Robert Jones, Mc-Minnville, Ore., brothers on trial here for murder, Saturday were faced with testimony by Crescent City Police Chief Viggo Hoyer that he found the blood stained jacket of slain Felix Molini in their auto-mobile.

Other witnesses testified Friday Other witnesses testified Friday that the two brothers were in the shoe repairman's shop on Jan. 26, the day Molini was shot. Richard, 28, and Robert, 20, were arrested later that day at Brook-ings. Ore.

arrested later that day at Brook-ings, Ore. Hoyer told the jury the jacket was found in the back of the Jones' sedan. He also identified a German Walther pistol and a .22 caliber revolver turned over to him by Brookings police as having been taken from the car.
