Twentieth century creative music of America will include contributions of Gulon, Copland, Cadman and Strickland. The descriptive works of Latin Americans, Lecuona and Casella with those of the Brazilian, Pinto, complete the list of new-world composers.

Modern European composers to be heard on the program include: Toch, Scott, Chabrier, Hindemith, Ibert, Prokofiev, Albeniz, Sibelius, Britten and Bartok.

A highlight of the program will be "Peter and the Wolf" by Prokofiev, and several contemporary choral selections by the Madrigal chorus.
