Women Scribes Tour New White House; Find Change Good But Cup Rack High

WASHINGTON (AP)—Apparently they want tall cooks at the White House.
It seemed that way to half a hundred women reporters who toured the executive mansion Sunday.
Its renovation at a cost of \$5,761,000, is near completion after more than three years' work.
Naturally the women scribes were interested in the new kitchen—all ultra-modern stainless steel and glass. But several reporters, average-sized women, tested out the overhead cup rack and found it hard to reach.
Otherwise this kitchen, designed by men to be used by women, is superb.
Painted a cool gray, it will be very easy to keep clean. The cabinets fused into metal. A whisk of a sponge and they'll be spotless. The stoves are electric, with broilers in tiers.
Out of this kitchen will come courses, sent by dumb waiter one floor up, for state dinners of at least 100 guests.
The room in which the women reporters lingered—in fact, several were willing to end the tour there—was the new solarium on the top floor.
Octagonal, it has a huge picture window overlooking the Washington Monument and the Lincoln Memorial.

World Policy Of U.S. Told

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman says the basic purpose of the American foreign policy is to build peace in the world—but not peace at any price. And he says it is succeeding.
"We are turning back the threat of Communism," the president says in a foreword to an 80-page outline of U.S. foreign policy, drafted by the state department at his request and printed for public use.
"We are not just sitting by, waiting for our fires when trouble starts in some far-away place," Truman said.
"We are actively at work... with our neighbors and friends... not only to overcome any threats to world peace but also to strengthen freedom and justice so that... the danger to peace will be less."
"The purpose of the American foreign policy is to defend the independence and the integrity of the republic. To do this we must build peace in the world; not peace at any price, but a peace in which the peoples of all countries—big and little alike—can live free from the fear of aggression. Everything we do in our relations with other countries has that paramount aim."
It was made clear that U.S. post-war relations with other nations have been molded by a continuing threat of Soviet aggression.

Reds Watched In Indo-China

SAIGON, Indochina (AP)—Reports persisted Saturday that Chinese Communists may be in Indochina in greater force than just military advisors and technicians. There was no confirmation.
With virtually all the North Tonkin border with China in Vietnamese hands, there is nothing to prevent the Chinese Reds at anytime moving in tens of thousands of troops to aid Ho Chi Minh's soldiers against the French Union forces.
But French and foreign intelligence reports fail to show such a movement was started. It is extremely difficult, however, for the French to learn just what is going on in North Tonkin since the Chinese Reds could by night slip thousands of troops across the border in Vietnamese uniforms and link up with troops fighting the French.
The only good window the French still have on Red China is at Monong in Northeastern Indochina. Latest reports from Monday say no unusual Chinese military movements have been spotted across the border in Kwangsi and Kwangtung Provinces.

Probers Call Off Scheme

WASHINGTON (AP)—House tax scandal probers called a week-end halt Saturday to their investigation of Henry W. Grunewald, leaving unanswered the question whether perjury charges will be brought against his attorney.
William Power Maloney, former Justice Department official, was threatened with a perjury charge Friday after he told his story of his relations with Sen. Bridges (R-N.H.), Grunewald and a five-million-dollar tax case.
Rep. Kean (R-N.J.), accused Maloney, now a New York lawyer, of swearing falsely on a previous occasion that he never borrowed money from Grunewald, a shadowy Washington figure with influence in high places.
The House group, which has produced evidence Maloney borrowed \$5000 from Grunewald, voted to forward a transcript of the lawyer's testimony to the Justice Department to consider whether he was lying under oath.
The committee plans to resume its hearings Monday by calling Hyman Harvey Klein, Baltimore wholesale liquor dealer whose five-million-dollar tax case involved not only Grunewald, but Sen. Bridges.
Maloney revealed Friday it was he who asked Bridges—the Senate Republican leader—to inquire "as a friendly favor" about a five-million-dollar repatriate tax assessment placed against Klein.
