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probably will be \$17,361.74 for asphalt paving, and \$22,261.14 for concrete. Sidewalks would be included in the job, and use of a special emulsified asphalt mixture in the cement for sidewalks was written into the specifications.

The mixture is Hydropel, a product of the American Bitumens Company, which is supposed to keep moisture from penetrating the concrete, and also to resist the effects of the freeze-thaw cycle. Concrete sidewalks here often go to pieces in short order, possibly because of freezing damage and also because the quality of local sand is not good. Otherwise, last night's Council session was short and routine. Business included: Approval of one building permit.

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
