### Forest Receipts Gaining Over Northwest Areas

Pacific Northwest national forest receipts for the first eight months of fiscal year 1952 climbed to \$21 1/2 million, an increase of almost 4 1/2 million over the same period of the previous year, according to Regional Forester J. Herbert Stone. The fiscal year began July 1.

Topping the 19 national forests in the region is the Willamette, Eugene, Ore., which collected \$3,911,923—an increase of \$1,841,710 over the same period last year.

Second and third highest income-producing forests in the Oregon-Washington region were the Olympic and Gifford Pinchot, which collected \$2,320,300 and \$1,641,839 respectively. Headquarters for the Olympic forest is in Olympia, Wash.; for the Gifford Pinchot, in Vancouver, Wash.

Twenty-five per cent of national forest receipts is returned to the counties in which the forests lie and used for schools and roads. An additional 10 per cent of the total receipts is used for Forest Service roads and trails.

Payments to counties have increased steadily in recent years according to Stone. In fiscal year 1951, Oregon counties received more than \$4 1/2 million or an average of 29 cents from each acre of National Forest land. Washington received more than \$3 1/2 million; 22 cents per acre on the average.

Receipts for other Pacific Northwest national forests for the first

eight months of fiscal year 1952 are as follows: Chelan (Okanogan, Wash.), \$480,912; Deschutes (Bend, Ore.), \$660,912; Fremont (Lakeview, Ore.), \$1,218,694; Malheur (John Day, Ore.), \$1,109,426; Mt. Baker (Bellingham, Wash.), \$1,400,542; Mt. Hood (Portland, Ore.), \$1,354,833; Osoyoos (Prineville, Ore.), \$1,529,896; Rogue River (Medford, Ore.), \$878,072; and Siskiyou (Grants Pass, Ore.), \$514,888.

Also, Siuslaw (Corvallis, Ore.), \$756,097; Snoqualmie (Seattle, Wash.), \$1,156,010; Umatilla (Pendleton, Ore.), \$32,887; Umpqua (Roseburg, Ore.), \$1,546,831; Wallowa (Enterprise, Ore.), \$88,115; Wenatchee (Wenatchee, Wash.), \$309,913; and Whitman (Baker, Ore.), \$335,673.

Hall, arraigned in justice court, pleaded innocent.
