**Plane Crashes Kill 12 Men**

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - Twelve military airmen were killed in two plane crashes in the Southwest Wednesday.

Eight died in the flaming wreckage of a B-29 bomber from Davis-Monthan Air Force Base here and four perished in the crash of a B-47 stratojet bomber from Kirtland AFB on the edge of Albuquerque, N.M.

Both crashes occurred shortly after the planes had taken off from their bases.

The B-29, with one engine dead, was trying to return to its base when it crashed, exploded and burned in the desert five miles from the base.

Names of the dead in this crash were to be released sometime Thursday, Major Maston Jacks, base public information officer, said.

**Klamath Falls Girl Aided By TB Association in Oregon**

 Attractive young Virginia Oberg has had far more than her share of tough luck. But she did have one lucky day back in November 1947.

On that particular day, the Tuberculosis and Health Association's mobile x-ray crew was working at Klamath Union High School. Virginia was a senior and on the staff of the KU paper "The Crater." X-ray day found Virginia busy trying to beat the Crater's deadline. . . . So busy that she decided she wouldn't take time to have one of the free chest x-ray pictures taken.

But Howard Holt, KU Journalism instructor then, insisted that Virginia visit the x-ray center and fortunately for her, she did.

The x-ray picture revealed only a few seconds posing for Virginia that day but it was fated to mean more than three years in a sanitarium for the unfortunate girl.

However, Lady Luck must have prodded Virginia into having the x-ray examination; if she had failed to do so she would probably be a bed-ridden invalid today. Instead, she is today a sparkling and gay young woman enrolled in business college.

The mobile x-ray examination at school revealed that Virginia was in the initial stages of tuberculosis. Virginia and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Oberg, were amazed to the point of disbelief. Virginia had shown no symptoms and was feeling fine at the time. But further examinations confirmed the findings of the mobile unit.

Wheels turned quickly. The TB and Health Association and the Oregon Health Department cooperated and within two weeks, Virginia was comfortably settled in the Eastern Oregon Tuberculosis Hospital at The Dalles.

Today, thanks to the skilled and expensive treatment in the hospital, Virginia is home and preparing for a normal business career. And that expensive treatment didn't cost her family one cent, thanks to the TB Association and the state of Oregon.

The pretty little blonde tells of her hospital life with a glow of warm thankfulness. She speaks with marked enthusiasm of the vocational training and recreation offered patients at the Dalles. The hospital, Virginia explains, not only works toward returning patients to their homes . . . it strives also to prepare patients who need it for a supporting job when they are released.

Virginia actually managed to complete her high school work in the sanitarium and was allowed to visit home a year later and receive her diploma at KUHS. In the sanitarium, Virginia's plight came to the attention of a former state high school principal who was also a patient and he became Virginia's private tutor so that she could complete her high school requirements.

If you would like to help the hospital at The Dalles, by the way, Virginia says the patients want books for their library. And they would especially like to have any old jewelry or mountings. Vocational classes remake the old jewelry and sell it.

Other patients make a little money by making and selling leatherwork, knitted articles and such.

Virginia was a guest of the Klamath TB Association Board yesterday at the board's monthly meeting. Then she voluntarily visited the Herald and News; she's grateful for the help she's received and
