## Civic Service Meet Slated

The second annual meeting of the Klamath Basin Civic Service League has been scheduled for March 31, 8 p.m. in the community lounge, 228 No. Bth.

Reports on the past year's operation of the lounge and rest rooms, including a financial report will be given and new members of the board of directors will be elected.

The Service League was organized and incorporated in March and April, 1950, on a non-profit basis for the purpose of establishing a public lounge for the benefit of rural and city women shopping in downtown Klamath Falls.

The organization of a service league represents a consolidation of the interests and efforts of 30 city and county organizations in promoting the project. Member groups include Home Extension

Units, Farm Bureaus, some Granges, Garden Clubs, Women's Clubs, several adult Church Societies, Fraternals and the Nurse's Association.

Intention of creating the League was to provide a way for cooperation of interested groups rather than to create a new organization.

Financing of the Lounge to date has been accomplished by the Service League, the Klamath County Court and the City of Klamath Falls plus individual contributions.

Memberships have gone to organizations making an annual contribution and affiliation has entitled groups to two voting delegates at the annual meeting.

The nine-member board of directors are Mrs. Earl Kerns, President; Mrs. Keith O'Hair, Vice-President; Mrs. Fred Rueck, Secretary; Mrs. Lee Holliday, Treasurer; Mrs. Leland Harris, Mrs. C. E. Dennis, Mrs. E. E. Kilpatrick, Mrs. Alice Vitus and Elenora Weatherford.

Advisors are Ed Gowen, Klamath County Court; Don Kenyon, City Council; Dr. Beth M. Kerron, Klamath County Public Health Dept.; Frank Jenkins, Klamath County Chamber of Commerce; A. M. Hattan, Klamath Merchant's Association.

In establishing membership by organizations rather than by individuals it was believed by the sponsors that a permanent backlog of capable public-spirited citizens would sustain the interest needed.

In 20 months a total registration of 21,479 which includes 9294 urban, 10,310 rural and 175 others, is a concrete demonstration that the service of the lounge is far-reaching.

The Service League is urging all member groups to send representatives or delegates to the annual meeting. Other interested men and women are also invited.
