**Oregon Teachers Win Fellowships**

**PASADENA, Calif.**—Two Reed College faculty members and one each from Lewis and Clark and the University of Oregon have won Ford Foundation fellowships to study education.

They are Kenneth E. Davis, Associate physics professor, and Maure L. Goldschmidt, political science professor, both of Reed; John B. Harrington, chaplain and chairman of the philosophy department at Lewis and Clark College; Richard A. Litman, assistant professor of psychology at the University of Oregon.

**Atom Spy Scare In Merry England Proves To Be Hoax**

**LONDON**—A spy scare involving A-bomb research center was exposed late Monday as an April Fool joke.

Three teen agers let the cat out of the bag when they learned they had caused a commotion clear up to the ministerial level of the British Government.

Monday night Harry Sibley, 14, and Neville Thompson, 13, showed up at the Highgate police station with documents marked "Harwell Atomic Research Establishment" and "burn after reading."

There were a number of blueprints and some dizzying mathematical notations.

The Highgate police put in a hurry call for Scotland Yard.

"We couldn't tell whether it was a formula for atomic energy or lemonade," a detective said.

So Scotland Yard called in experts of the Supply Ministry, which runs the atomic establishment.

They were pretty sure the papers hadn't come from Harwell—"of course this might be the work of some independent private researcher."

Meanwhile newsmen looked at the calendar and ran down young Sibley.

"Last night I met Victor Mehra at the Highgate youth club," he said. "Victor is 15. He showed me a buff-colored folder. Inside were typewritten papers with some symbols and signatures in ink. There were also a couple of blueprints."

"Victor said I should take them to the police."

Victor, an apprentice factory draftsman (that's where he got the blueprints), told reporters: "I didn't think it would go as far as this. I made up the bundle as an April Fool's joke at lunch-time yesterday."

**Army Makes Changes In Rotation**

**SEOUL, Korea**—A slow-down in rotation went into effect Tuesday for regular U. S. Army soldiers and draftees in Korea.

It won't affect National Guardsmen. They must be discharged by August.

Under the new system men in the front line can expect to go home after 18 or 21 months.

Men in artillery battalions and supporting units who live in tents near the front and are fired on occasionally can go home after 13 or 14 months.

Those at rear headquarters of an infantry division, or in Seoul or Pusan, will be kept in Korea for about 18 months.

The Eighth Army will continue to send about 20,000 soldiers home monthly under the new system. Many of these will be National Guardsmen of the 40th (Southern California) and 43rd (Oklahoma) Divisions.

Eighty Army spokesmen said the new system was put into effect to make up for the loss of the guardsmen and because of the difficulty of getting replacements.

In Washington the Army said it was "a more equitable system... based on hardships and hazards actually encountered by individuals in Korea."

Rotation is based on a complex point system. A man is sent home after receiving points for "26 constructive months of service."

Under the new schedule a man in (1) an infantry battalion at the front gets four points a month; (2) a regimental headquarters, division forward headquarters, or in a directly supporting unit receives three points; and (3) at corps headquarters, division rear headquarters or other rear area gets two points.

The middle group, known as the "intermediate combat zone," is a new designation.

**Water Year Record Seen**

**REDMOND**—One of the biggest water years on record for the Crooked and Deschutes River basins was forecast Monday.

Reporting at one of a series of Oregon snow survey meetings, W. T. Frost of the Soil Conservation Service, Medford, said the Crooked River watershed is 165 per cent of average and the Deschutes 155 per cent.

High water in the Crooked River which recently flooded 150 families out of their homes in the Prineville area, might increase if warm weather or heavy rains melt the mountain snows, Frost said. The rivers are falling now because of cold temperatures which have slowed the runoff.

His forecasts: The Crooked River will flow at 210,000 acre feet, 172 per cent above average, in the April to September period this year. The Ochoco reservoir now contains 33,200 acre feet of water and will be filled easily. A charge of 50,000 acre feet of water from the reservoir is indicated for the April to September period.

**Firm Sues For Back Tax**

**PORTLAND**—The Pendleton business firm of Gillanders and Burroughs, Inc., filed suit here Monday to recapture \$32,321 in taxes from the federal government.

The suit asserts the internal revenue bureau illegally applied and collected a surtax on firm surplus that was needed for conduct of business.

The years 1946 through 1949 were involved. The suit also asks \$7,251 interest.

The firm owns, operates and rents farms, business properties and dwellings, does mortgage and contract financing, and operates a wholesale grocery business.

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**Idaho Maps Fight Over Hells Dam**

**WASHINGTON**—Idaho Gov. Len Jordan and other opponents of the proposed Hells Canyon Dam on the Snake River were to present their views to a House interior subcommittee Tuesday.

The committee, headed by Rep. Engle (D-Calif.), Monday heard final arguments from administration spokesmen favoring construction of the 357-million dollar multi-purpose project, and at least three members expressed dissatisfaction at some of the testimony.

Final administration witnesses included William A. Dittmer, power manager of the Bonneville Power Administration, and Gordon Fernald of the Army Engineers Corps' North Pacific Division office at Portland, Ore.

Dittmer's answers to questions concerning power output of the dam brought charges from Rep. Saylor (R-Penn.), a member of the committee, that he was being "evasive." Saylor said he couldn't understand how Dittmer could say Hells Canyon would add 1,124,000 kilowatts of power to the Bonneville system. During the summer months, he said, water would go into storage and production would be but 66,000 kilowatts.

Saylor said Dittmer was "evasive" when Dittmer said this was possible because peak run-offs at Hells Canyon come at different times than at other dams on the
