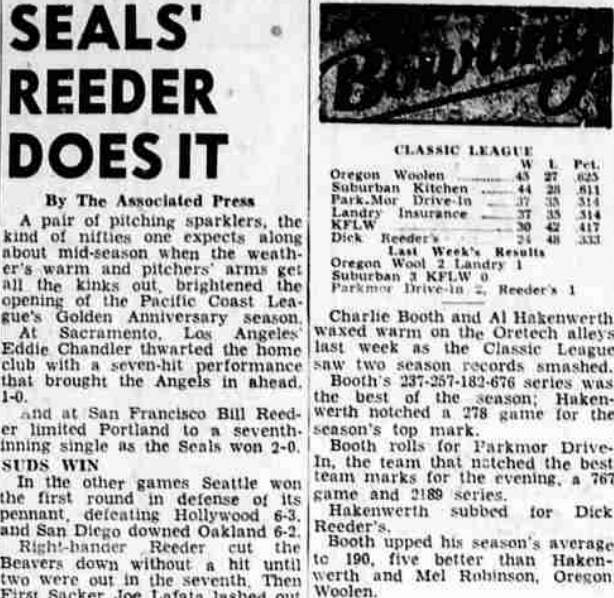
Carter Keeps Title in Win

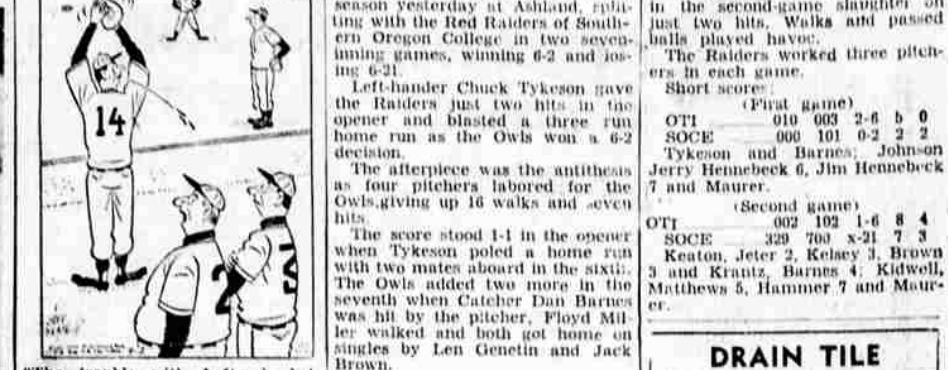
