The skull and bones were turned over to the Sheriff by George Reiling of Poe Valley yesterday.

They were found in a ditch on the Reiling place by 14-year-old Emory Seay.

Sheriff Britton said the bones might be remains of an Indian buried in that part of the country years ago. The skull was intact except for the lower jaw, and a dozen teeth in the upper jaw were still in good condition.

The thigh bones, if those of a person, indicated a person of big stature.
