Tax Returns Set Record

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government collected a record-breaking 11 billion dollars in taxes last month. Announcing this Wednesday, the treasury department said the government still is in the red for the current fiscal year.

Income taxes accounted for almost 10 billions as the tax intake for March, 1952, was listed at \$8,810,645,271.

This tops the previous record, set in March, 1951, by nearly 2 billions. Last year the total was \$8,104,645,271.

But the government still was \$3,338,783,597 in the red through the third quarter of the fiscal year that ends June 30.

The federal deficit dropped from \$8,305,276,752 on March 14 to 3-13 billions on March 31.

At this time last year, the government had a surplus of just over 5 billions.

With three more months to go, treasury officials said they wouldn't be surprised to see the deficit for the year run only 5 billions rather than the \$8,200,770,000 forecast in President Truman's budget message.

Oregon GOP Cheers Taft

PORTLAND (AP) — The Taft and Kefauver camps were jubilant in Oregon Thursday over their candidate's victories in the Wisconsin and New York primaries.

Taft's Oregon manager, Lowell Paget, said it demonstrated that Taft still was the leading Republican candidate for president.

Walter J. Dennis, chairman for Kefauver forces in the state, said he was confident all the time that Kefauver would win on the Democratic side.

Supporters of Gen. Dwight Eisenhower said there was significance in the fact Taft did not get a majority in the Wisconsin voting. Eisenhower was not on the ballot there, and write-in votes were not allowed. Walter L. Phillips, Salem chairman of the Oregon Eisenhower Committee, said he thought Eisenhower, if he had been on the ballot, would have received a substantial part of the vote given Harold E. Stassen and Gov. Earl Warren of California.

Grass Roots Look At Industry Set

NEW YORK (AP) — The National Federation of Financial Analysts Societies announced Thursday that it will take a "grass roots" survey of American industry from April 29 through May 29 in connection with its annual convention in San Francisco May 5 and 6.

More than 400 members will view 47 plants of leading industrial corporations during the three-week field trip in nine states, including California, Oregon and Washington.

The NFFA is composed of groups of investment analysts in 12 principal financial communities of the nation.

Bus Strike Hits At Feeder Lines

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A prolonged Pacific Greyhound bus strike may force some of the smaller bus lines in the affected seven Western states out of business, says a state transportation official.

Charles Overhouse, transportation engineer for the state Public Utilities Commission, said Wednesday a number of feeder bus lines, station restaurants and commission agencies, already are in perilous financial shape because of the strike which started March 2.

The 2,000 striking drivers and station employees are demanding a five-day week plus wage increases.

Air Raid Sirens To Be Purchased

PORTLAND (AP) — Portland will pay \$12,825 to get its projected seven big engine-driven-air raid warning sirens installed.

The sirens will cost \$51,300, but the state will pay one-fourth of the cost and the federal government 50 per cent. The sirens will be scattered through the city, placed on platforms 50 feet high.

The City Council voted money for the sirens Wednesday.

SPEECH TOURNEY

EUGENE (AP) — The annual Oregon High School Speech Tournament will open here Friday with 187 students from 44 schools participating.

The entrants are winners of tournaments held in 10 districts. Each will give two speeches in one of the nine fields of speech into which the tournament is divided.

The competition will continue through Saturday.

Senate May Sit On Dam Issue

BAKER (AP) — The president of the Idaho-Oregon Hells Canyon Development Association believes the Senate also will hold a hearing on the proposed Hells Canyon dam in the Snake River.

Albert Ullman, Baker, president of the association, said Sen. Morse (R-Ore.) indicated he would attempt to get a Senate committee hearing.

Ullman and 19 others returned from Washington this week after testifying before a House committee. They urged construction of the dam.

Four Perish In Apartment Blaze

CHICAGO (AP) — Four persons, including a baby-sitting grandmother and her grandson, perished in a fast-spreading fire which destroyed a 12-flat, four-story apartment building Wednesday night.

Eight other persons, including six firemen, were injured. About 30 persons fled or were carried by firemen from the structure.

Fire officials said the blaze, of undetermined origin, apparently started in the basement.

Jury Indicts Two Officers

SPOKANE (AP) — A federal grand jury has indicted three special officers of the U. S. Indian Service on charges of beating up two prisoners on the Yakima Reservation at Toppenish a year ago.

The indictment names Lawrence Goudy, Willard White and Charles Hoskins. All are free on bonds of \$500 each.

U. S. Attorney Harvey Erickson Wednesday released two informations superseding the secret indictments. The case had been presented to the jury by Victor C. Wierheide, special assistant to Attorney General McGrath.

The informations allege the officers deprived Andrew Juarez and Douglas Valentine of their civil rights after the two were arrested on April 19, 1951 and March 14, 1951 respectively.

It charges the officers did "strike, bruise, batter, beat and injure and assault and threaten" them. Erickson said that as far as he knows it is the first case of its kind to be brought against Indian Service officers in the Northwest.

Liquor-By-Drink Opposition Set

PORTLAND (AP) — The Oregon Anti-Liquor League intends to campaign against an initiative measure, filed at Salem earlier this week, to permit sale of liquor by the drink in Oregon.

George Smith Brown, league superintendent, said ministers of the Portland area would be called to an April 15 meeting "to consider the program to meet this latest wet threat."

Chamber Groups Stand By Idaho Power Company In Hells Canyon Dam Fight

WASHINGTON (AP) — Spokesmen for two Oregon chambers of commerce told Congress Wednesday the Idaho Power Company, not the federal government, should build power dams on the Snake river.

They testified before a House Interior subcommittee considering a bill which would authorize the Reclamation Bureau to build a \$37-million dollar dam at Hells Canyon, on the Idaho-Oregon border.

The project would flood five damsites proposed by Idaho Power.

Blaine Hallock of Baker, Ore., representing the Baker county Chamber of Commerce, ridiculed the navigation, recreation and flood control benefits claimed for Hells Canyon dam.

Chester K. Sterrett of the Portland Chamber said that organizations such as the Bonneville dam, which earn their own way.

"But there is grave doubt," he said, "that Hells Canyon will be self-liquidating."

"The only living residents of the canyon are rattlesnakes, jackrabbits, coyotes and gophers," Hallock testified.

He said the big dam "would completely destroy recreation," not improve it, and flood control benefits would be small.

Development of the Snake river by Idaho Power Company, he said, would "save the taxpayers millions of dollars and put millions on the tax rolls" at a time when the nation has a debt of 260 billion dollars.

Hallock told the people of the area are "gravely concerned" over the government's "assault on the free enterprise system" and competition with private business.

Committee Chairman Engle (D-Calif.) interposed to say that utilities operate with monopoly privileges and guaranteed profits, so "when you're talking about free enterprise."

Hallock said Sen. Morse (R-Ore.) "was not acting for the people of Oregon" when he introduced a Hells Canyon bill in the Senate early last month.

The bill is a companion to the measure before the House committee.

Sterrett said the government could build dams at other points on the Snake river which would not affect plans of the Idaho Power Company.

Among other possible projects, he said, are Nez Perce and Mountain Sheep dams.

Rep. Budge (R-Idaho) said a government engineer had testified that a dam at Mountain Sheep would provide more storage and power but would cost more than Hells Canyon. The Mountain Sheep site is below Hells Canyon.

Rep. Bosone (D-Utah) said the engineer had added that Hells Canyon is an "essential" part of the comprehensive plan for development of the Columbia river and its tributaries.
