PORTLAND, Ore. — The Veterans Administration office at Salem will be closed May 1, Regional Manager Charles Langdon said Wednesday. "There is a reduction of Veterans Administration personnel in this office," he said, "and the work load at the Salem office has not been heavy enough to keep the office open." He added that the state Department of Veterans Affairs as well as veterans' organizations had been taking care of most veteran problems in the Salem area. Only two employees are affected: a stenographer, who declined a transfer to Portland, and the contact representative who will be shifted to Eugene to replace an employee transferred to Portland, Langdon said.
