Conley Pushed But Wins

MADISON, Wis. (AP) — A quarter of defending champions leads a field of 40 of the nation's top collegiate boxers into Friday night's semi-finals of the NCAA boxing tournament.

Two of the four scored decisive victories in opening matches before 13,850 fans Thursday in the University of Wisconsin Fieldhouse, a third won a narrow split decision and the fourth drew a bye.

Top upset of the 29-bout initial skirmishing was turned in by speedy Bill Miller of Syracuse, who whipped Defending Light Middleweight Titist Dick Murphy of Wisconsin.

Heavyweight Bob Ranck of Wisconsin and Featherweight Neil O'Brien of Minnesota were easy victors in their initial showings.

Everett Conley, Washington State's two-time lightweight king, was hard pressed to nip John Randall, also of Minnesota. The split decision was unpopular with the 7,763 fans who watched the evening bouts.

The fourth titlist, Light Heavyweight Chuck Spitzer of Michigan State, drew a bye.

Michigan State sent five men into the semi-finals, as did Wisconsin and Gonzaga. Miami, Idaho State, Idaho and Louisiana State qualified three men each, Minnesota, San Jose (Calif.) State, Washington State and Syracuse two each, and Hawaii, Penn State, South Carolina, North Carolina A & T, and San Clara, one each.

Newsom Back With Nats

Old-hat Newsom is back. Newsom who claims he has spent more years in Washington than any other man with the exception of the late President, Franklin D. Roosevelt, has signed for his fifth hitch with the Senators.

Baseball's famous nomad, who owns up to 43 years of age, hooked on with the Senators as a relief pitcher Thursday.

Newsom had been working out with the Senators at Orlando, Fla., and looked pretty good.

But the Cincinnati Reds spoiled his return by beating the Senators, 5-1, at Charleston, S. C. Lefty Harry Perkowski went all the way and checked the Nats on five singles. The Reds collected eight blows off Bob Porterfield and Sandy Comarca.

Russ Meyer of Philadelphia also went the distance as the Phils nipped the St. Louis Cardinals 4-3, at Waveros, Ga. Meyer allowed only four hits including three in the second inning when the Cards scored all of their runs.

The Boston Braves edged the Brooklyn Dodgers, 5-4, in 13 innings at Mobile, Ala. Ebba St. Claire doubled home the winning run.

Dave Philley socked a three-run homer to spark the Philadelphia Athletics to a 6-4 victory over Columbia of the South Atlantic League at Charleston, S. C.

The Chicago Cubs scored their seventh straight victory as they turned back the Pittsburgh Pirates, 10-5, at Beaumont, Tex. Roy Smalley paced the assault with a three-run homer.

Dallas of the Texas League held the Boston Red Sox to a 1-1 tie in a game that was called because of rain after five innings. Don Lenhardt homered for Boston.

Rookie outfielder George Wilson continued his fine hitting for the Chicago White Sox by doubling home the winning run in the eighth inning in a 2-1 triumph over the St. Louis Browns at San Antonio, Tex.

Eight Survivors In Golf Quarter-Finals

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Eight survivors of two rounds of match play, including former Champion Marjorie Lindsay of Decatur, Ill., headed into the quarter-finals of the Trans-Mississippi Women's Amateur Golf Tournament Friday at the Arizona Country Club.

Relegated to the sidelines was the defending champion, Mary Ann Downey of Baltimore, Md., beaten Thursday by a newcomer to the Trans-Miss competition, Mrs. Lyle Bowman of Richmond, Calif., 5 and 4.

Friday's lineup of matches: Orrie DeMoss, Corvallis, Ore., vs Edean Anderson, Helena, Mont.; Miss Lindsay vs Barbara Romack, Sacramento, Calif.; Mrs. Bowman vs Pat Garner, Midland, Tex.; Mrs. Dorothy Stamps, Oakland, Calif., vs Mrs. Cliff Prather, Phoenix.

Feature battle was between Miss Lindsay, 1950 Trans-Miss winner and runner-up the year before, and California's Barbara, a 19-year-old comer whose booming shots have drawn praise around the country the past few months.

The DeMoss-Anderson match promised to be close, too. The two are former college partners, at Oregon State and are close friends.

Miss DeMoss was carried to the 18th hole, and it took a five-foot birdie put, before winning Thursday from Barbara Dawson, Piedmont, Calif.

Miss Anderson defeated Marie Jacks, Phoenix, 3 and 2. Miss Lindsay ousted Mrs. Jack Kennedy, St. Louis, 7 and 6, and Miss Romack defeated Mrs. John Holt, Longview Wash., 5 and 3.

In the lower bracket, Mrs. Bowman, who also starred at Corvallis and Portland before moving to California last June, got the jump on Miss Downey on the first hole. She held a four up lead at the turn and closed out the match with a 40-foot putt for a birdie three on the 14th.

Miss Garner edged Mrs. Eldon Edes, Hollywood, Calif., 3 and 2. Mrs. Stamps defeated Mrs. Jimmy Hines, Palm Springs, Calif., 7 and 6, and Mrs. Prather defeated Mrs. S. A. Ginsburg, Phoenix, 5 and 3.

One stroke behind the leading 59 shooters as the Masters' second round began were Benjamin Harrison Hogan — 1951 National Open and Masters Champion — and Samuel Jackson Sneed — the 1951 PGA Champion. Also at 70 was Al Bessell.

Those five led the charge on par at the Augusta National's par of 36-36-72. Eight others sliced off one stroke.

Shooting 71 were Johnny Revolta, Fred Hawkins, Doug Ford, Lloyd Mangrum, Tommy Bolt, Skip Alexander, Lew Worsham and Joe Kirkwood.
